Rush of North Carolina College for Negroes. As a result of this meeting, the leaders who will serve to carry out the plans for civilian defense training among the Negro women have been announced as follows: Mrs. W. D. Hill, Chairman; Mrs. A. Heninburg, Co-Chairman; Mesdames E. R. Merrick, A. T. Spaulding, and G. W. Cox, unit Leaders. Others will be added to this group of volunteers as the complete organization is being perfected.

The Annual ingathering and display of garments of the Needle Work Guild will take place at the Algonquin Tennis Club on Fayetteville Street, November 13.

All directors are urged to bring their collections in early as possible so garments and donations can be checked.
