Expect 10,000 At Eagle-Bulldog Clash

Hampton Pirates Stop Mighty Morgan Bears For Greatest Upset

Hampton Institute, Va.—Hampton Institute's 1941 "Pirate" grid-ers won a place in the Colored Intercollegiate Athletic Association's hall of fame, Saturday afternoon when they upset the dope and Morgan College's undefeated "Bears" to the score of 8 to 6. With Cathrell Payton, the "Pirate's" stellar senior back, leading the invasion into enemy territory, the mammoth Morgan "Bears" were stopped for the first time in two years of athletic competition by a plucky, fighting band of "Pirates," who didn't know when they were licked.

Coach Jimmie Griffin, in his first year of CIAA competition, definitely won recognition as a mentor who has got to be watched, for the "Pirates" unleashed everything in the bag.

Hampton took the offensive in the first quarter by pushing the ball down the field and scoring a safety in the first minute of play, when Gibbons of Morgan fumbled and was then tackled by Grice behind the gold line Morgan then let go its vaunting attack and began whittling holes in the tiny Hampton line, and the 3500 spectators in the Hampton Armstrong Field witnessed one of the most spirited first quarters in athletic history—a quarter that was only surpassed by the sensational fourth.

In the second quarter, Morgan would not be denied, and on Hampton's 26-yard line, Gibbons hurled a pass to Drake for Morgan's first blood, making the score, Morgan 6, Hampton 2. The whole third quarter showed plenty of action, but neither team succeeded in tallying any points.

In the fatal fourth, Hampton relentlessly marched down to Morgan's 2-2 yard line where Cath-

Norfolk Unit Routs Saints 25 To 7 At Chavis Park

The Norfolk Unit of Virginia Union University continued its winning ways here last Friday when it downed the Saints 25-7 at Chavis Park.

Early in the opening period Norfolk stopped a Saint threat on the 7. From punt formation Russell skirted right end for 38 yards. Using off tackle plays Norfolk moved down to the 4 and Russell scored.

The Saints came back to forge ahead through. Byrd recovered a fumble of the Unit 47. After two incomplete passes, Pullen passed to LeCompte on the 35 and he moved down to the 23 before he was stopped. LeCompte then passed a pass

to Pullen on the 12 and he battered his way across the goal. LeCompte converted to give the Saints a 7-6.

Norfolk struck again in the third period. Taking over on the fifty it marched straight to a tough down in a drive that was marred only by a holding penalty against the Unit. Russell scored around the right from the 20 and Curtis converted.

In the final quarter the Unit marched 68 yards for its third score. In a sustained drive that featured brilliant off tackle slant-land climaxed with Turpin's score boosted the Norfolk margin.

All Roads Lead To Durham For Annual Turkey-Day Classic A&T and N.C. College

JOE LOUIS ON "FREEDOM'S PEOPLE" NOV. 23

The first name among Negroes in sports—heavyweight boxing champion Joe Louis—will be featured in the third broadcast of the "Freedom's People" series over the National Broadcasting Company's Red network from 12:30 to 1 p. m. EST November 23.

"Freedom's People," one-month series sponsored by a national advisory committee with which the U. S. Office of Education cooperates, dramatizes Negro contributions to American life. The November program features Negroes in sports.

Jesse Owens, who showed body-worshipping Nazi something in the way of physical ability when he captured three first places in the 1936 Olympics at Berlin, will join Louis on the broadcast. Bill Stern, ace sports commentator, will question the taciturn Louis.

Owens holds world records in the 100-yard and 220-yard dashes and the running broad jump. He won the 100 and 200 meter and broad jump events at Berlin and also ran on the American team which won the 400-meter relay. After a professional tour and various other jobs, Owens has returned to Ohio State University to complete his studies.

Louis, undefeated in the ring since he won the heavyweight title in 1937, will probably speak from California where he is residing while awaiting a call from his draft board.

Cab Calloway, whose "hi-de-ho" has been a jazz trademark for years, will lead his orchestra in one of the musical numbers. On the more classical side the broadcast will present the Golden Gate Quartet, well-known to radio and concert stage audiences.

The "Freedom's People" series is made possible by grants from the Rosenwald Fund and the Southern Education Foundation, together with broadcasting facilities offered by NBC and network stations.

Acting for the U. S. Office of Education in cooperation with the special committee are Dr. Ambrose Caliver, Senior Specialist in Negro Education, and William D. Boutwell, Chief of the Radio Service. Irve Tunick, veteran radio author, writes the scripts. Original music and arrangements are prepared by Dr. Charles Cooks.

"Eagles" of North Carolina To Meet The "Bulldogs" of A. & T. Thanksgiving

A crowd of 10,000 is expected to be in Durham, Thursday to witness the annual football battle between the Bulldogs of A. and T. College and the Eagles of North Carolina College.

The early part of the week visitors to the game had already begun to arrive and the two colored hotels in Durham could provide no further reservations. Many names were crowded by visitors, and some of those here for the game were forced to seek sleeping accommodations in nearby cities and towns.

The game this year is of unusual interest because of the record of North Carolina Eagles who have gone undefeated in National and CIAA encounters. The Eagles up to date have won seven games, making two hundred points, allowing their opponents only twelve.

North Carolina College will have

at stake in its game with A. and T. the CIAA championship, the North Carolina State championship and its place as one of the two major teams in the nation that so far have gone undefeated. Morris Brown of Atlanta is the only other outstanding Negro player that has not suffered a defeat this year.

Virginia State College Trojans Drop Weakened A. & T. Eleven By 7 - 0

Petersburg, Va. — There are just 26 shopping-days left until Xmas and the Trojans started their shopping early here today for the C. I. A. A. crown as they outplayed and out-scored a determined but weakened A. and T. aggregation, 7-0, before approximately 4,500 spectators.

Sparked by the brilliant line thrusts of fullbacks Willie Hurst and Herb Harvey and the passing magic of 'Bo' Robinson, freshman half-back, the Trojans piled up a total of 14 first-downs and gained 186 yards by passing and rushing. The A. and T. Aggies picked up only four first-downs and 97 yards by passing and rushing.

Ave Perkins, stellar fullback for the North Carolinians paved the way by a fumble for the Trojans to make the only touchdown of the game. It was in the last three minutes of the first half when he fumbled on his own 19-yard marker where 'Tank' Carter, Trojan tackle, recovered.

At this point, the Jefferson coached Trojans opened a sizzling passing attack with 'Bo' Robinson doing the tossing. The first pass was short but sweet and quarterback Rainey accounted for four-yards with a host to Bulldogs smothering him on the A. and T. 15-yard line. A penalty for time against the Aggies took the Trojans to the 10 where Ennas Cave, halfback, picked up two yards and another first-down to put the Trojans on the 8-yard line. The net returns on the next play, after a clipping penalty against the Virginians, put the ball on A. and T.'s 15.

On the next play, Robinson faded back to the 25 and tossed an aerial to 'Doc' Hurley on the 14. Two line plunges by Robinson netted 6 yards. A fourth-down pass out into the flat, Robinson to Jenkins, right-end, accounted for six-points. Again Robinson faded back and completed a pass to Cave who

raced over the goal-line for the extra-point.

Not once during the entire game did the Aggies threaten the Trojan goal.

In the closing minutes of the 3rd quarter, a 15-yard holding penalty robbed the Trojans of a second touchdown when fullback Harvey plunged over from the one-yard line.

Art Harrington, substitute fullback, was the sparkplug of the Aggie backfield while Hughie Lawrence, tackle, turned in a brilliant game on the line.

'Tank' Carter, junior tackle, was a stellar standout in the strong Trojans wall that yielded only three first-downs to the invaders.

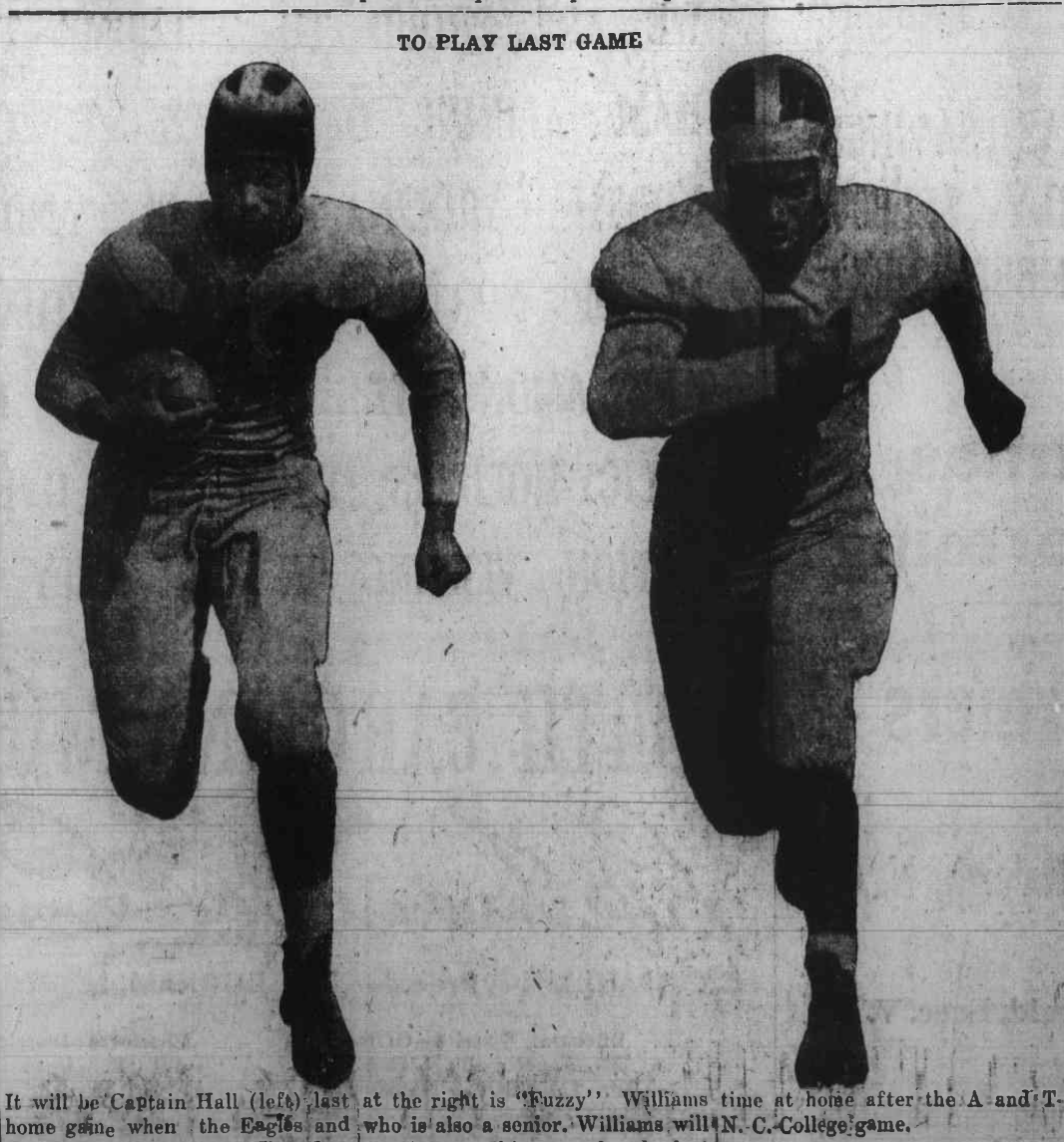
