



many of these were Negroes. "We discovered that approximately 9,350,000 were receiving from \$2,000 and \$3,000, and Negroes formed a very insignificant proportion of those. Then between 44,000,000 and 45,000,000 were found to be earning between \$1,-500 and \$2,000, but most of them

were not Negroes. We discovered 28,000,000 drawing between \$1,000 and \$15.000, but even they were not in the Negro's category. More than 16,000,000 of our Citizens drew incomes between \$500 and \$1,000, and less than half of them were Negroes; and finally we found 8,250,000, living below the \$500 level, and nearly all of them WERE Negroes.
