Here is a chap whom destiny allegedly picked out in the beginning for titular honors, but at every tura Bob has been thwarted, either by illness or by losing a losing a close decision to some fighter who counted, or by refusal of the guy with the title to have any truck with him. In fact, Beau Jack and his front office didn't want anything to do with Bob Montgomery in the ring, but the matter was entirely out of their hands.

In Montgomery, Beau Jack, who carries the fight whenever it is possible on the theory that the man who throws the most punches might land enough to win, will be meeting a fellow who has made a lifetime study of how to take care of people who bring the fight to him.

Montgomery is considered our best boxer's greatest fighter; he has made a specialty of this type of boxing. Inside he is in reality a vicious bobcat. He work tirelessly on the other fellow's middle, his heart, kidney, his chin with uppercuts, his sides with vicious, cruelly

LIVINGSTONE COLLEGE TO DEDICATE PRICE MEMORIAL BUILDING DURING COMMENCEMENT WEEK PROGRAM

SALISBURY — The Joseph Charles Price Memorial Building, a \$150,000 structure erected to the memory of the founder of Livingstone College, will be formally dedicated during the coming commencement celebration, President Trent announced this week.

Now in the final stages of completion, the Price Building represents the culmination of a sustained drive by the A.M.E. Zion Church and officials of Livingstone College to honor the memory of the noted educator and statesman who founded the college and served as its first president.

The dedication ceremonies will be in the charge of the Board of Bishops of the A.M.E. Zion Church and will take place on Commencement Day, Tuesday, May 25. Dr. N. C. Newbold, director of Negro education for the state of North Carolina, will be official representative

Railroads of the United States in 1942 attained a new high record in the average number of tons per carload freight, the Association of American Railroads announced today. The average for that year was 46.1 tons per car. This is the fourth consecutive year in which a new high record has been established. In 1941, the average was 38.2 tons and in 1940, it was 37.7 tons.

This record resulted from the country-wide program in which shippers and receivers of freight have united to produce maximum efficiency in the loading of cars and also from General Order ODT No. 18, applying to carload freight, which became effective November 1, 1942, and which requires cars to be loaded heavier than in the past. By increasing the average load per car, greater utilization is being obtained from available equipment.
