Negro College Women To Receive Nursing Information

Negro college women in more than 100 schools will receive first hand information on the new U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps during a series of field visits by Mrs. Pauline B. Butler, R. N., and Miss Oriannan Collins, R. N. They represent the National Nursing Council for War Service and the Division of Nurse Education, U. S. Public Health Service. Mrs. Butler and Miss Collins have just started the tours, which will continue through January.

Prior to their departure, the two nurses conferred in New York with Miss Lucile Petry, Director, Division of Nurse Education. The corps is designed to meet wartime nursing needs and is administered by the Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency.

Both Mrs. Butler and Miss Collins cite the great need for Negro nurses in public health and as a guiding force toward the expansion of other health services. Nurses with college backgrounds they say, are particularly desirable.

The 1943 goal for the Corps is 65,000 new students enrolled in the country's schools of nursing. Recruits are provided free tuition, fees, maintenance, and smart outdoor uniforms. In return, they pledge service in essential nursing, either civilian or military for the duration of the war.

States which Mrs. Butler will visit are Ohio, Kentucky, Tennessee, Mississippi, Arkansas, Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma and Missouri. Mrs. Butler is a graduate of the Harlem School of Nursing, New York City and served as head nurse and ward instructor at the hospital from 1937 to 1939. After serving for a year as a staff nurse in the Chest Clinic of the City Department of Health, Buffalo, N. Y., she returned to New York City for further study at New York University, where, in 1941, she received her Bachelor of Science degree with major in public health nursing.

Miss Collins will visit colleges in Maryland, Washington, D. C., West Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Alabama. Also a Harlem Hospital School of Nursing graduate, she has served as general duty nurse and ward instructor at the institution. In the past year she has been taking postgraduate work in nursing education at Columbia University, New York City.

Doctor Robert P. Daniel, president of Shaw University, has thrown his full support behind the United War Fund of North Carolina, according to a statement released today. The United War Fund is representing North Carolina in the campaign of the National War Fund to raise \$125,000,000 this fall for use on the military front, the United Nations front, and the home front. "The United War Fund," said Dr. Daniel, "is a great cooperative project which appeals to the loyalty and sacrificial spirit of every good American."

"The welfare of the Negro race has always advanced in a spirit of cooperation. At this time we have the opportunity to share in meeting the needs of millions of people who do not enjoy the blessings which we have. In addition, this is our opportunity to make possible the continuation of the services to our soldiers which would otherwise present a great problem to them when they are not on military duty. DURHAM — Glowing tribute was paid to Gaston Monks Edwards, Principal of the Whitted Elementary School and former president of Kittrell College, at funeral services held October 8th in Saint Joseph A.M.E. Church in the presence of a large congregation which included members of the family, faculty, friends and hundreds of students.

The speakers at the funeral included the colleagues of the deceased in the Durham School System; Shaw University, Kittrell College, and the civic life of Durham. **SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS SPEAKS**

W. F. Warren, Superintendent of Public Schools of Durham, praised Professor Edwards' work in the system for the last fourteen years and described his love of children and faith in his faculty as an outstanding characteristic. Mrs. Cora T. Russell spoke for the School Master's Club. K. W. Green, Dean at South Carolina State College and former dean at Kittrell College under the deceased, represented Kittrell. Dr. Arline Young of the Shaw University faculty represented that institution. John H.
