NEW YORK CITY, Dec. 7.—On December 8th the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals, sitting in New York City, will hear the Winfred Lynn case. Arthur Garfield Hays will argue Lynn's case and will carry it to the Supreme Court.

The Lynn case is the only court test made to date of the legality of the U. S. Army's discriminatory treatment of Negro soldiers. Winfred Lynn, a colored corporal, claims he was illegally selected in a Jim Crow quota. His case rests on the 1940 Draft Act, which specifically forbids "discrimination against any person on account of race or color" in selection and training.

The National Citizens Committee for Winfred Lynn, with offices at 1 West 125th Street, was recently formed. Among its sponsors are George S. Counts, William H. Hastie, Willard S. Townsend, George L. RATION-MINDED XMAS HINTS

Are you burning the midnight oil trying to make your ration points and the requirements of your holiday food calendar come out even?

It's no small problem. We homemakers must make the Christmas season as cheerful as possible — as gay. For it will help greatly to sustain homefront morale.

Yet everything we do to make it a gay holiday season seems to cost too many ration points which have a hard time stretching over ordinary requirements.

Here are ration-minded holiday hints which you might like to incorporate in your food planning.

Christmas Balls
Combine..... 1/2 cup light corn syrup
1/2 cup sugar
1/4 cup water
1/2 tsp. vinegar
1/2 tsp. salt
Place over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils.
Add..... 260° or thick syrup stage
Remove from heat, add..... 1 package (5 cups) rice cereal
Stir only enough to blend.
Place in a bowl.....
Pour hot sugar syrup over cereal and nuts. Mix until every kernel is coated. With slightly greased hands, form into balls. Wrap in transparent or waxed paper. Makes about 24 balls.

Cranberry Relish
Combine in saucepan..... 2 cups sugar
1 cup water
1 stick cinnamon
1/2 tsp. whole cloves
Boil for 2 minutes.
Add..... 4 cups cranberries
Cook until cranberries pop open. Remove from heat. Chill.
Then stir in..... 1 cup celery, finely chopped
1 cup ground carrots
1/2 cup chopped almonds
Pour in covered dish and store in refrigerator until ready to use. This relish will keep for weeks properly stored in the refrigerator.

Indian Pudding
Temp.: 250°; Time: 1 hour
Scald..... 1 quart milk
Pour milk over..... 1/2 cup yellow corn meal
Cook on low heat for 30 minutes.
Add..... 2 tbsp. melted margarine
1/2 cup molasses
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. ginger
Beat..... 2 eggs
Add to corn meal mixture. Pour into greased casserole. Bake.

Gingerbread Men
Temp.: 375°; Time: 8 to 10 min.
Cream together..... 1 cup margarine
1 cup sugar
Add..... 1 cup molasses
4 tbsp. milk
Sift and measure..... 5 cups flour
Add flour and soda to first mixture. Roll this on a floured board. Cut with cookie cutter in shape of a gingerbread man. Place on a greased cookie sheet. Under head of gingerbread man place a loop of string for hanging. Bake. When cool they may be frosted with thin confectioner's sugar frosting. Decorate with..... small cinnamon candies for buttons; currant for eyes and nose; small piece of maraschino cherry for mouth.

Delicious Apple Pudding
Temp.: 375°; Time: 1 to 1 1/2 hours
Pare and core..... 8 to 9 apples
Arrange in a greased pudding dish.
Combine and work together..... 1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup margarine
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. ginger
Fill cavities of apples with this mixture and sprinkle remaining mixture over top.
Add..... 1/2 cup water
1/2 cup orange juice
Bake. Serve with thin custard sauce, or light cream.

Pumpkin Pie
Temp.: 425°; Time: 45 minutes
Combine..... 1 1/2 cups steamed and sliced pumpkin
1 cup brown sugar
3 eggs
1 1/2 cups milk
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 tsp. ginger
1/2 tsp. nutmeg
1/2 tsp. cloves
1/2 tsp. allspice
1/2 tsp. salt
Beat until thoroughly blended. Four into ungreased pie shell. Bake.
