department of the organization "has decided to delete such expressions from songs or other copy used on the air."

**FIRST POSITION**

NBC was first challenged on used of the word by Mr. Murphy, who said in a letter to network last Spring that he was surprised at and resented the use of the word.

In answer to his letter a subordinate in the NBC music department stated that the term was used as an "endearment" to colored people and that she did not feel that they resented being referred to as "darkies."

Mr. Murphy then sent an NNPA reporter to the NBC offices to find out if the policy expressed by the subordinate in the music department was in line with the overall policy of the network.

**POLICY CONFIRMED**

In an interview, NBC executives confirmed the policy as laid down by the employee in the music department but insisted that they had no intentions of offending colored people in permitting the term to be used.

At that conference Eiges stated that the NNPA articles had caused "some concern" among network officials and after discussing it, they had decided to refer the matter to the NBC program department for study.

Last Monday the NBC program department recommended that the word be banned from its programs.

Lesnevich, downcast at his crushing defeat by a man he had honestly believed he could lick, conceded that Charles was a sharp puncher and a difficult man to hit, but implied that he didn't think Ezzard was too finely conditioned. Where he got that idea was something of a mystery to observers. Ezzard was much more ag-

gressive than in his dreary win over Walcott. He showed a marked disposition to mix it from the start and displayed little fear of Gus' vaunted right, which had stretched several fair heavyweights in recent years.

When Gus sailed in throwing rights and lefts, Ezzard usually either brushed them off or let them slip harmlessly past his jaw and then slammed vicious clouts to Lesnevich's face. Now and then he poured a full right swing into Gus' side, blows which obviously hurt.

As early as the interval between the second and third rounds, Gus' seconds were applying an ice pack to his puffed left eye. In the sixth the veteran sustained a gash on his left cheek from which he gored, and in the sixth his left eye got the works.

Manager Vella told the veteran between the sixth and 7th that if he failed to land a good punch in the next stanza he was going to stop it, and he proved to be a man of his word. He has managed Gus throughout his career and there is a close bond between them.
