NCC Holds Initial Meet

Three phases of activities which concern graduates of North Carolina College — the James E. Sheppard Memorial Foundation; the Homecoming program, and a campaign to create a broader interest in the Alumni activities — highlighted the local chapter's first meeting of the term at a dinner meeting at the Du-Nut Shop's Jade Room, on Wednesday, September 21.

Dr. J. M. Hubbard, spoke to the chapter members about the history of the Alumni Association, beginning with its organization in 1916, and continuing until today.

James T. Taylor, Director of the Shepard Foundation Campaign, explained the program \$250,000 for a scholarship and behind the current drive to raise loan fund, and asked all Alumni to support the program whole heartedly.

Alumni Executive Secretary, Marion S. Johnson, told the members that elaborate plans were being made and all that was needed was the cooperation of the Alumni to insure the greatest Homecoming ever.

"For the first time in our history," said Mr. Johnson, "Miss North Carolina Scholastic" will be selected from nominations of all high schools on the basis of scholarship, leadership, and talent, and will be crowned during the halftime, along with "Miss North Carolina College, Homecoming Queen."

Another feature of the program will be a parade beginning at 10:00 a. m. with a large number of floats entered by campus, local organizations and businesses. More than 10,000 spectators are expected to attend the Homecoming game between the "Eagles" and Virginia State "Trojans."

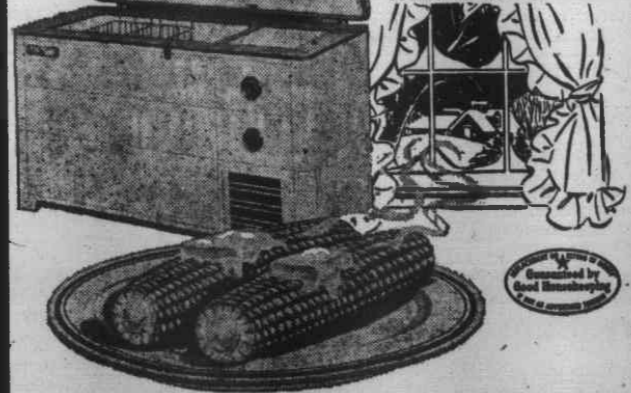
