# Farm News

TIMELY FARM QUESTIONS QUESTION: How can I get rid of fox pox in my laying flock? ANSWER: W. G. Anderson, extension poultry specialist at State College says fox pox is on the rampage in North Carolina in flocks which have not been vaccinated against the disease. The pox is caused by a virus and may be spread by direct contact or by mosquitoes biting diseased birds and transmitting the disease to healthy susceptible birds.

Affected birds, says Andrews, usually have wart-like lesions on the comb, wattles, and face. An affected flock in heavy egg production shows a rapid decline in egg laying. The disease may manifest itself in the nasal passages with roop resulting.

If the disease makes its appearance in the laying flock, Andrews says all unvaccinated birds should be isolated, if practical, and vaccinated with pigeon pox vaccine. Individual treatment of the affected face portions is beneficial. Tincture of iodine or carbolated vaseline may be applied. If the disease makes its appearance in a community and your pullets have not been vaccinated, but are laying, pigeon pox vaccine should be administered immediately.

CLUBS TO OBSERVE ACHIEVEMENT WEEK More than 115,000 4-H Club members in North Carolina will join with nearly two million other boys and girls throughout the United States in observing National 4-H Achievement Week, November 5-13. L. R. Harrill, 4-H leader for the State College Extension Service, has announced.

Special programs will be held in practically all of the State's 100 counties, Harrill said. Newspapers, radio, exhibits, and posters will be used extensively in calling attention to the accomplishments of club members during the past year. Church services, special meetings, window displays, stunts, and membership drives are among the activities which have been planned.

The three-fold purpose of the observance is to report to the nation on over all 4-H achievements, recognize outstanding club members, leaders, and parents, and provide a basis for planning next year's program. Harrill said reports from State leaders indicate that a new record has been set by 4-H members this year. More than 76 per cent of the boys and girls enrolled have completed a wide variety of farming and homemaking projects, and achievements in these projects have topped those of any previous year.

COMMUNITY BOOTHS FEATURE OF FAIR Community exhibits prepared by Negro farm families of Halifax County were one of the outstanding features of an agricultural fair held recently in Enfield, reports D. J. Knight, Negro county agent for the State College Extension Service. First place in the competition was won by Eastman community with an exhibit on five recommended steps for improved corn production. The display, prepared jointly by adult farmers, New Farmers of America, and veteran students under the direction of Percy Richardson, was awarded a cash prize of \$50.

HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS By Ruth Current State Home Demonstration Agent To put buttons on so they

won't budge, remember to use thread strong enough for the weight of the button; to use tape or other reinforcement underneath if the fabric is thin; and, perhaps most important, to arrange for a shank of thread which gives room for the buttonhole to slide under the button without pull on the fabric. When sewing on a button, lay a pin or darning needle over the top and sew over it. Then withdraw the pin and wind thread around the shank underneath. Fasten the thread on the wrong side of the garment, first with a buttonhole stitch then with a couple of over and over stitches. To make snaps fast, use at least four or five stitches to each hole. Buttonhole stitches hold snaps better than ordinary stitches. Zippers hold best if they are stitched on by machine rather than by hand. Stitch the zipper tape to the fold of goods, close to the metal of the zipper, then trim off any extra fabric to the width of the tape and stitch so there will be no loose ends to catch in the zipper. On of the newest and most time-saving fasteners is the snap fastener which is hammered on rather than stitched. These fasteners now come in light and heavy weight, plain and in color. The hammering gadget comes with them. The clothing specialists advise on firm fabric and are best suited to sports or work clothes. On thin or fragile cloth a pounded-on fastener may strain or break through and leave a hole. Machine stitching on both sides of the row of snap fasteners is recommended to take part of the pull and save strain on the fabric. When waxing the floors, wax the feet of the furniture too. Then when the furniture is moved around it will not mar the floor.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK IS PLANNED North Carolina farmers were urged this week to join in observance of National Fire Prevention Week, October 9-15, by eliminating some of the more common fire hazards usually found on farms. H. M. Ellis, in charge of agricultural engineering for the State College Extension Service, asserted that the nation's annual farm fire loss includes destruction of 100 million dollars worth of property, injury to 10,000 farm residents, and the death of another 3,500 farm people. "Six known causes account

for three-fourths of our farm fires," Ellis declared. "Action taken to eliminate hazards incident to these causes could save the nation 75 million dollars a year."

The hybrid corn exhibit set up by the Agriculture Department of Eastman High School won first prize of \$50.00 at the Firemen's Agricultural Fair in Enfield. The theme of the exhibit "Beat Governor Tuck" was selected since our Governor, W. Kerr Scott, accepted a challenge from the Governor of Virginia to enter a hybrid corn contest to see which state could make the highest increase in corn production per acre this year. The Eastman exhibit was a result of 5 years work with N. P. A. students, adult farmers and veteran farmers. The 5 essential steps in producing hybrid corn were well illustrated by charts and examples. It was clearly seen in this exhibit that if you follow the 5 improved practices of producing corn major results are accomplished. It was stated by H. P. Richardson, teacher of agriculture, that as a result of the 5 years work with students and farmers, the number of bushels of corn raised per acre has increased from 25 to 111 1-2 bushels per acre in the Eastman School.
