## THE HOUR OF TRUE LEADERSHIP

We think white and Negro leaders in Durham should be congratulated in that they have viewed the school suits, instituted by Negro parents on behalf of their children, with a marked degree of calmness and objectivity. Apparently thoughtful leaders of both races have looked upon the suit as an effort on the part of Negroes to become self sustaining so as not to be a drag or liability on our economy, and to secure equal training with white citizens in order that they might assume their portion of the responsibility of citizenship.

Poorly trained Negroes can no more make their full contribution to society than poorly trained white people If the Negro is going to be required to meet the same standards as others he must be given the same kind of training.

Heretofore Negroes have been the victims of a vicious circle. They have been told that they could not work on certain jobs because they were not trained. When they would request that their schools provide the kind of training for such jobs, they were told that they did not need it, because there were no such jobs available for Negroes.

The suits in Durham, Plymouth, Wilson and other counties in which they are being contemplated, therefore, must be interpreted as a normal effort on the part of Negroes to break through these barriers that have to a great extent held them in economic bondage.

That the objectivity of the suits is fully understood on the part of all Negroes may be attested to by the solidarity which is being exhibited by all elements of the group, from the highest to the lowest. Such solidarity belies any suggestion that the suits have been instituted by a few disgruntled Negroes. There is no fly-bynight effort here, but a calm and determined resort to the only course left them to make available for their children the full opportunity to become useful citizens of their community.

Such solidarity sounds a note of warning to weak-kneed Negro leaders who may wave under anticipated and expected pressure of the old Broughton type. Such pressure is sure to come from certain well-known sources on top Negro leaders to desert the cause at its most strategic moment. We warn these leaders to gird up their loins and stand steadfast and immovable lest they become the mockery of their own people.

The hour is at hand when every true leader will rise to the occasion and false ones will slink to their dens of self agrandizement. The hour is at hand when true friends of the Negro in this State will be made known. The hour is at hand when honest leaders of both races will keep the faith they have had in each other through the years, a faith that has been established on the firm ground of mutual respect and admiration and not the false ground of deceit, prejudice and malice.

#### A NEW PARTY NEEDED

The recent appoinment of a Negro to the National Platform Committee of the Young Republican Nationl Federation is only a drop in the bucket of what it is going to take to lure the Negro back to the Republican fold. Unless the Young Republicans can do something with their elders there is little hope the G. O. P. will escape the certain death that awaits it.

The formation of a coalition of Republican leaders with Southern Democrats in Congress to halt the attempt to pass civil rights legislation has made the name Republican odious to many once dyed-in-the-wool Negro faithfuls of the G. O. P.

What this country really needs is a new party to take the place of the Republican Party that apparently is gasping for its last breath. Unless

something is done in this direction soon, or a miracle man is found to resurrect the G. O. P., we in the United States may find ourselves a nation of a one-party system.

It probably would not be a bad idea for the Dixiecrats and right wing Republicans to form a party of their own based on the principles for which both of these out-of-date elements stand. Then there could be more party harmony within the ranks of the Democratic party and more work done in Congress.

As it now stands the Democrats are attempting to run with the wolves and gallop with the hounds in that they are endeavoring to satisfy both their Southern and Negro constituency, a thing that will utltimately prove to be an impossibility.
