The Observance has the endorsement of the Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance of the City of which the Rev. C. E. Sharpe is the President. The World Day of prayer is inter-racial, inter-denominational, inter-national.

Rev. Fisher To Speak At Library; NHW Observance

In commemoration of the twenty-fifth observance of Negro History Week, February 12-19, sponsored by the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, the Standard L. Warren Public Library will present the third topic in its sixth season of Book Review Forums, Monday evening, February 13, at 8 o'clock.

Rev. Miles Mark Fisher, III will speak on the subject, "The Negro's Gift Of Spirit To The Western Hemisphere."

Rev. Fisher has spent twenty-five years in research and study which is summed up in his doctoral dissertation, "The Evolution Of Slave Songs Of The United States." The dissertation attempts to prove that the Negro spirituals are not primarily folk music but are history expressing in song an individual's reaction to his circumstances. The author assigns to each song a probable date and place of origin and gives a description of its message.

 In observance of Negro History Week the North Carolina College Alumni chapter of Greater New York will sponsor the "Pertrayals of Finer Arts and Spau of Progress" exhibit at the Golden Gate Ballroom here Saturday and Sunday.

The exhibit, to be participated in by the leading businesses of the city, will also benefit the James E. Shepard Memorial Foundation.

Mrs. Anna Bobbitt Gardner, director of the Academy of Music of Boston, has presented the exhibit for many years in Boston.

Through the use of local resources for exhibitors in Art, Sculpture, Handicrafts and Business, the program will show achievements of Negroes in these fields of endeavor.

Among the notables to handle exhibits is Countee Cullen, famous poet. He will supervise an exhibit Afro-Arts Bazaar exhibition. Also the Rosa-Meta House of Beauty and United Mutual are, scheduled to sponsor exhibits.

The exhibits, free to the public, will be open on Saturday from 10 a. m. to 5 p. m.; and on Sunday at 3 p. m. students from the Academy of Music in Boston will be presented in a dramatic, musical and interpretative dance program entitled "Some Missing Page in American History."

On Saturday evening after the exhibits close, the Alumni chapter will sponsor a dance and Fashion Show.

The project, already widely received with enthusiasm, is expected to be attended by large numbers because of the special appeal during Negro History Week and of the event's past success under Mrs. Gardner's supervision.
