Some types of colds respond very favorable number of requests for soil tests to sodium sulfathiazole medica tion of the drinking water, making a dilution of 1:1000 by dissolving two teaspoonfuls of the drug to one gallon of water. Treatment should not be required for more than three to five

Irritating chemicals used as sprays, for dusting, or for disinfecting drinking water are not ecommended.


