Hints To Farm Homemakers

All good cooks know that delicious soup may be brewed at home from inexpensive materials, such as the dried beans and peas now in such plentiful supply. Our food specialists, tell us that there are three types of soup which are most nourishing: 1) cream soups, reinforced with added milk products such as dry milk evaporated milks or grated cheese; 2) thick meat soup, with vegetables and rice, noodles, macaroni or other cereal products; 3) thick bean or pea soup, which is especially tasty if made with ham bone or salt pork and flavorful vegetables likes tomato, onion and celery.

Some appetizing ways to step up the protein of soup are: sliced hardcooked eggs on top of cream of spinach or asparagus soup. Cooked sausage or small hamburger meat balls or slivered cooked meat may be added to soup.

used to dry—contain more moisture than most dried apples, and can make dishes just as delicious as those made with fresh apples. Follow recipes on box for good success.

Take better care of Pots and Pans. For dishwashing with dispatch, soak your utensils after use. A pan allowed to dry encrusted with food plays havoc with dishwashing time. For utensils that have held cheese or egg mixtures, milk or dough use cold water. For those that have held frosting or syrup and such sticky things use hot water. For cleaning other greasy pans, pour off fat while still warm, then soak pan in hot water and soap, this softens grease and makes the final clean-up after meals a snap.

When the time to wash the dishes arrives, scrape the pots and pans that need it with a rubber plate scraper, paper towel, or a vegetable brush which is especially good for greasy pans.

Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: How can I treat colds in my laying flock?
ANSWER: There is no specific treatment that applies to all types of colds. The first objective in an outbreak is to correct the cause. Stimulate an increase in feed consumption by feeding wet mash. Grain moistened with feeding oil containing vitamin A is usually helpful. Some types of colds respond very favorably to sodium sulfathiazole medication of the drinking water, making a dilution of 1:1000 by dissolving two teaspoonfuls of the drug to one gallon of water. Treatment should not be required for more than three to five days.

Irritating chemicals used as sprays, for dusting, or for disinfecting drinking water are not recommended.

QUESTION: When should I buy my turkey poult?
ANSWER: Poult should be bought 6-12 to 7 months prior to the time you wish to market them.

If possible, go to the hatchery yourself or have the poult delivered by the hatcheryman in a car or heated truck. Poult shipped may get a respiratory disease from other poult or chicks which are placed near them. If poult are shipped a long distance, some may arrive in a starved condition and not learn to eat and drink.

QUESTION: Is it necessary to feed minerals to hogs?
ANSWER: It is most important to have a mineral mixture available for all hogs at all times. Keep the mixture in a dry place where the hogs can eat it at will. A suggested mineral mixture, which can be made at home, includes 10 pounds of finely

FEPC Can Still Win In House, Says NAACP
NEW YORK

Despite all the tricks and blunders of the past two weeks, it is a well-known fact in Washington that the FEPC bill can pass the House and will do so within the next month if the people will keep up pressure for passage.

This was the statement from Roy Wilkins, acting secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and chairman of the National Emergency Civil Rights Mobilization, to civil rights supporters across the nation.

All observers in the capital admit that FEPC can pass the House," he said. "Even the Southerners admit this. The unfortunate fight over discharge petitions between Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr. and Rep. Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., has confused the public and given some members of Congress an 'out,' but the real chances of the bill have not been hurt too badly."

What Other Editors Say—

School Pupils Are Not Warmed By Blueprints

The poor conditions in some Person County schools as revealed in the Grand Jury report to the Superior Court will explain why Negroes in some localities are bringing suit against school officials for equal facilities. To what extent similar conditions exist in North Carolina or other states is not completely known, but the Person report describes conditions all too prevalent.

Inadequate toilets, toilets in poor condition, inadequate heating, defective flues, inadequate seating, inferior water supply—what a list of inadequacy in essentials to decent comfort and health! Here, it seems as is so often the case, the explanation is in plans to make better provisions—new school buildings or consolidation, for example.

A child is not warmed by blueprints, nor does he drink surveys. A promise is not a decent toilet. It is a false economy which denies toilets or sufficient heat or safe drinking water to children because a few years hence there will be a new school building, up to the minute in equipment, or the present building will be abandoned and the children transported elsewhere.

One encouraging feature shines in the Person report: members of a grand jury, citizens of a county, made the report as a result of their investigations. When expressed dissatisfaction with conditions comes from the people, corrective action is to be expected. The order of the Court, backed by the evident indignation of the grand jury, promises improvement in school conditions.—DURHAM MORNING HERALD.
