 not be relieved of their obligation to respect the law, simply because they regard it as unwise or wrong. Nor can personal beliefs or prejudices justify failure to respect the legal rights of others. The right of all Americans to equal treatment under law is specifically guaranteed by the Constitution and laws of the United States. . . . To countenance disregard of such right is to sanction disrespect for law and thereby weaken the fabric of our society."
