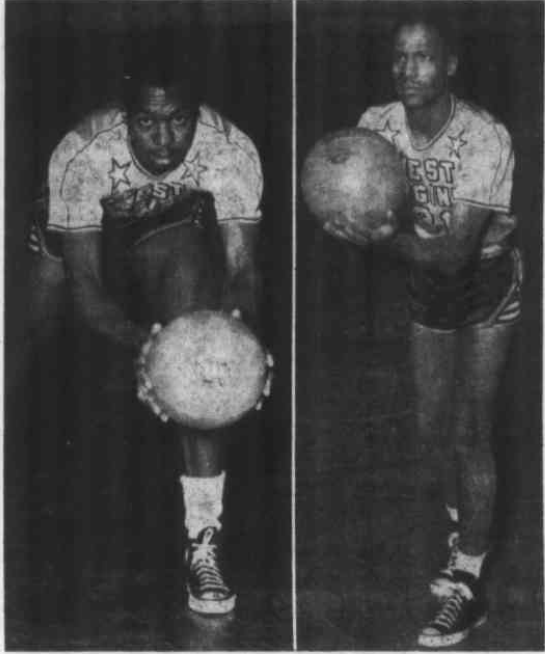

## Shaw Bears Win Over Howard University

Spotting the Howard Bisons a big lead in the opening minutes, the Shaw Bears caught up with the fast Capital City bunch and distanced them 56-48 in a thriller-packed contest Monday night in Spaulding Gymnasium. For the first sixteen minutes of the game, Frank Booth and Thomas Harris accounted for all the visitors' scores, Booth racking up 11 and Harris 8 to give the Bisons the lead at 19-14.

The turn of the tide came when Horace Burton, big Bear guard, went into the lineup. Burton slowed down the dead-accurate Booth and paired with Elliott Artis, Shaw center, for the biggest share in wearing down the Bison advantage. Artis drove in to hook one at 19:00 and the Bear were ahead for the first time 26-25. John Hobbs made good a layup to end the half 28-25.

In the second half Walter (Roxboro) Robinson, Shaw center, led the bombardment for the Bears to give Coach Wilson's lads a 49-39 advantage after 15 minutes. Five minutes later the visitors were back in contention at 51-48. The goal sunk at 18:00 by Frank Booth was the last tally for Coach Eddie Jackson's boys from Washington. ## Eagles Win Second Annual Colleges Of N. C. Tourney

The North Carolina College Eagles won the second annual Colleges of North Carolina Tournament by defeating the Broncos of Fayetteville State Teachers' College 75-60, Saturday night in the final contest played before a capacity crowd in Spaulding Gymnasium. The Eagles took a lead after twelve minutes which the Broncos were never able to overcome. The Fayetteville State team took second honors in the tournament.

Warlick was second with 18. For the Aggies, R. McClenny was top scorer with 27 and B. Thomas was runner-up with 16.

Earlier on the evening of Fayetteville State quint decided the Shaw Bears 52-47 in the biggest upset of the tournament. The Broncos led the locals 23-7 after ten minutes and were ahead 31-21 at half-time. The Bears never got nearer than the five points by which the winners led at the end.

Smith Costen took top scoring honor for the Broncos with 14 points and Leroy Way with second with 12. For the Bears, Alfred Shields was high scorer with 17 points; Horace Burton was runner-up with 9.

The victories for North Carolina College and Fayetteville were their second win in the first day of play. In the afternoon the Broncos edged Winston-Salem Teachers' College, 58-52 in the opening game of the tournament. In the second game the Eagles whipped the St. Augustine's Falcons, 71-61.

The Winston-Salem five will be paired with St. Augustine's in the consolation match which was scheduled to be played this evening at 6:30 o'clock. Shaw and A. and T. will battle for third place in the second contest tonight at 8 o'clock. Tournament awards will be made following the final contest between Fayetteville State and the North Carolina College Eagles.

NCAA AND ITS PROBLEMS

The National Collegiate Athletic Association has its problems not in its purposes but in its execution of eligibility rules and principles. The main reason that there has been a "sanity code" set up is to keep the members within bounds of reason if not within bounds of the Association's rulings. The main problem the N. C. A. A. has to deal with is how much aid the athlete can receive during his college participation. Some colleges are paying their athletes sums beyond the general public's imagination. Other colleges are just paying a little bit. Hardly any college fails to offer a man, along with free tuition and no fees, free room and board. This latter takes the form of meals in the college refectory and a room in the dormitory, to a grocery account and a house for the athlete and his family. Certain NCAA schools I know of have some athletes receiving free room, board, tuition, fees, laundry, books, "personal maintenance fees" and an automobile. True, the colleges don't supply all these luxuries, but the contributions are made by associated agencies such as the Alumni clubs the "Win-em-all Association," and the "Can't Win-Get Moving" societies.

Several weeks ago the NCAA had on the guilty list, members it was going to banish from membership because of their breaking the rules, but these dissident members have been dealt with quite leniently since those dealing out the punishment are just as guilty as those being punished. Justice is often tempered by a guilty conscience. The non-conformists simply said, "yes, we give aid to athletes under no other guise than that they deserve it." The NCAA said, "You are violating the rules and you should be dropped from membership." There could not be mustered enough votes to drop the rebels, however.

The NCAA is now in a peculiar spot: It is advocating a platform which its members overtly admire and appreciate but which these same ineffectually violate.

"A good program, but impractical" when it comes to attracting the best athletes to a college and keeping them satisfied and in the spirit to give their all to "dear old Siwash" and fill those huge grandstands and pay those coaches salaries.

By virtue of the lack of athletic revenue, and more by virtue of genius, belief in athletics as being justified only as an educational instrument, the CIAA, SWAC and SIAA and MWAC are adherents of the sanity code and every other code except the freshman rules which in itself is a farcical attachment and substitute for professional form team. The entire NCAA would do more to stay within its own rules by following the rules of these major conferences.

## Shaw, Virginia State, St. Augustine's In Triangular Boxing Meet In Raleigh

Eight boxing bouts were presented in the Triangular Boxing Meet staged Saturday afternoon in Shaw University's Spaulding Gymnasium. The teams of Virginia State College, St. Augustine's, and Shaw were represented in the competition.

In the opening bout, Erik Lythcott, Shaw, 117, won a split decision over Tom Reid, Virginia State, 115. Thurman Cal-

vine, Shaw, 132, scored a TKO over June Carter, St. Augustine's, 130, in the third. Wilbur Wallace, Virginia State, 145, won by a split decision over Charles Slocum, St. Aug., 145.

Clarence Hunter, Shaw, 154, got the unanimous decision over Brady Mixon, Virginia State, 159. A TKO in the third was scored by Alvin Davis, Virginia State, 162, over Charles Mosee, St. Aug., 160. Talmadge Artis,

Shaw, 174, split-decided Ruby McGoines, Va. State, 165. George Singfield, Shaw, 175, won a unanimous decision over Alex Morris, St. Aug., 160.

An exhibit bout was fought between James Brown, St. Aug., 184, and Robert Overton, Saint Aug., 203. The referee was Johnny Winters; judges were Dr. J. B. Davis and Wiley Latham.

## Eagles End Second With Pair Of Wins

Howard's Bisons, who had started a late drive for a tournament berth, fell behind 9-3 in the first minutes of their game with the Tar Heels and were never in the running thereafter while Morgan, with nothing to lose but the game itself, lost just that in a display of punches offensive tactics which matched a highly porous defense.

Neither contest was similar to its predecessor last month, when the Eagles barely edged the Bisons and Bears during an important road trip. The final games, therefore, were important in terms of what the Eagles' trio

of high-scoring stringmen would do.

In both games, Ernest Warlick, a Hickory eager, burned the meshes for 25 points. Harry "Trees" Taylor, the somewhat fabulous 6'6" center from Gary, Ind., dunked in eight points against Howard and 21 against Morgan. William Young, from Kansas City, Mo., collected nine points in the Howard contest and six in the Morgan tilt.

Young and Taylor, along with Captain Harold Hunter, from Kansas City, Mo., ended their careers as college performers in the Morgan game.
