**President Trigg Cited**

Dr. Harold L. Trigg, president of St. Augustine's College, has been awarded a National Urban League Certificate of Recognition in cognizance of his appointment by Governor Kerr Scott last year to the Board of Education of the State of North Carolina. The awards are made, according to the letter of citation sent Dr. Trigg by the National Urban League's Committee on Awards, "to American Negro citizens everywhere who, in the course of the year have contributed to the rich heritage of our nation."

Dr. Triggs, the only Negro occupying such a position in the South, is an active member of the State Board of Education, serving on several of its committees, including the Building Committee, which is charged with the responsibility of approving plans and allocating of State funds for the comprehensive program of building and enlarging public school plants, white as well as Negro.

**St. Augustine's Student Wins French Prize**

Albert C. Henry, a member of the freshman class at St. Augustine's College, won first prize in a contest conducted by "La Vie," a newspaper published by Banks, Upshaw and Co. of Dallas, Texas, in the French language, for students.
