Search Continues For Incubator Baby

BRONX, N. Y.

With mystery shrouding an incident of a missing baby, all of New York has made much fuss over the disappearance of a 10 day old Negro girl who isn't where she should be, in an incubator at the Lincoln Hospital. The baby, Chaneta Holden, weighed only two pound and 11 ounces. Why anyone would want to take the unclad infant from an incubator and how they escaped with her are the two questions baffling local police. Already they have thoroughly checked laundry chutes, opening sewer drains, incinerators, pipes and what not. They have taken the 500 bed hospital apart in a futile search. But there is no trace of Chaneta.

Two hospital attendants are being held for questioning. They are Doris Williams, a nurse and a Mrs. Spencer who was on duty in the baby's ward. Both are Negroes. Miss Williams was the last person to see Chaneta (at 8 p. m. Thursday).

Dr. Drew was killed when the car he was driving overturned near Burlington Saturday morning.

The Howard president praised Dr. Drew as "a brilliant surgeon, a first rate research man, and an able teacher."

Howard University has one of the two medical schools for Negroes in the United States. Dr. Drew was a graduate of the McGill University Medical School, Montreal, Canada. At Howard, he had successfully trained nearly a dozen young Negro surgeons for national boards in surgery.

Death rode the highway near here last Saturday morning and took the life of Dr. Charles Drew noted blood plasma expert, when his auto, which he was driving, left the road and turned over several times.

Riding with Dr. Drew at the time of his fatal crash were Drs. John R. Ford, Walter R. Johnson and Samuel Bullock. Drs. Bullock and Johnson escaped with minor injuries and left for Winston-Salem after being treated at Alamance General Hospital. Dr. Ford, who was more seriously injured, was confined in the hospital with a fractured arm and several other injuries about the body.

The three surviving physicians, all of whom were associated with Dr. Drew at Freedman's Hospital, Washington, D. C., were enroute to a medical clinic at Tuskegee Institute, Alabama.

Highway patrolmen who investigated the wreck told representatives of the CAROLINA TIMES that in their opinion Dr. Drew went to sleep while driving and the car ran off the highway suddenly awakening Dr. Drew. When he attempted to get the car back on the highway, he lost control resulting in the fatal crash.

Funeral services for the noted physician were held Wednesday at one o'clock at the 19th Street Baptist Church in Washington. Surviving Dr. Drew are his

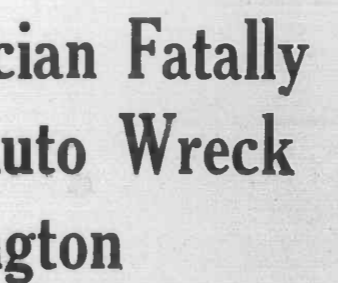
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Here are the remains of the car in which Dr. Charles Drew was riding when he met death on a highway near Burlington last Saturday morning. — Photo by Stanback.

Anderson Named To Top Post

RALEIGH

The North Carolina Teachers Association shattered all precedents here last week in its 69th annual session when it repudiated the alleged attempt of Dr. Harold L. Trigg, W. R. Collins, O. R. Pope, and other ultra-conservatives to get control of the association, and went on to appropriate \$500 to aid in the equalization school suits, now pending in federal courts.

Old timers who have followed the record of the organization over a period of 25 years or more, declare that it was the most successful meeting in the association's history as well as a far cry from the days when the "Uncle Toms" and "Aunt Dinah's" controlled the organization lock, stock and barrel and throttled any attempt at liberalism.

The decisive action of the association grew out of reports that the presidential candidacy of Dr. F. L. Atkins, President of Winston-Salem Teachers College, was supported by an allegedly disgruntled "cabal" composed of Trigg, Collins, and Pope. The State's teachers overwhelmingly elected A. H. Anderson, principal of Kemberly Park High School, Winston-Salem, as president.

Other association officers elected included C. L. Blake, principal, West Charlotte High School, vice president; Miss Willie Jeffries, supervisor, Northampton County, Jackson, record book secretary and Dr. Nelson H. Harris, director of the Shaw University Summer School, treasurer.

Executive members elected included Mrs. Ada Larnigan, Shaw University, Raleigh; W. G. Richardson-Barr, Harrison, High School, Selma, N. C.

Defeat of the Trigg-supported candidacy of Dr. Atkins was viewed by many teachers as the most significant act of the meeting.

Gov. Scott, in public acknowledgement of the Trigg appointment to the State Board of Education, first of its kind in the South in recent years, admitted Friday night while delivering an address to the association that the controversial Raleigh educator was perhaps not the best choice for the spot.

Dr. Trigg apparently enjoyed however, the dubious distinction of serving as butt of the Governor's very funny jokes.

Among Dr. Trigg's activities during the convention was an attempt to defeat the teachers' move to appropriate \$500 for the school equality suits. He did not act directly, however, instead, in typical Trigg fashion, he prodded W. B. Wicker, (Please turn to Page Eight)
