Munford is tentatively scheduled for another Capitol recording date during June.

Because of her age, Esther was prevented from making the last show, and Dinah subbed. The fans went home with the opinion that Little Esther is in a class all her own-and ditto Dinah.

And Redd Lyte, singer with the Johnny Otis band, showed himself to be one of the most versatile lyric-lassoers in the business, whether he's doing his singing from an upright position or from and upside down one. You read that right - Lyte stands on his head, does contortions, or might even jump off the the stage while singing about the "gal that done him wrong."
