C. F. Graves To Receive The Distinguished Service Award

Raleigh — Professor C. F. Graves of Elizabeth City, a graduate of Shaw University, Class of 1901, has been chosen to receive the second Alumni Award for Distinguished Service. Mr. Graves will receive the award at the institution's 85th Commencement Exercises to be held Monday afternoon May 29, at 3:30 o'clock in Raleigh Memorial Auditorium.

A pioneer educator, educator, Mr. Graves for 32 years was President of the Roanoke Institute at Elizabeth City. Upon the discontinuance of the Institute, he was named principal of the Bank Street School in Elizabeth City, where he served until his retirement. The high-respected educator holds the Master of Science degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

For a number of years Mr. Graves has served as an instructor in Religious Education in church-workers institutes in North Carolina and other states.

He is a member of the International Council of Religious Education and is founder and chairman of the North Carolina Baptist Loan Association and a one time vice president of the Aiken Bank.

Mr. Graves becomes the second winner of this newly-established Alumni Honor at Shaw University. Last year the distinction went to William Curtis Craver, Executive Secretary of the Bagby Street Branch, YMCA, Houston, Texas. Mr. Craver received the award on the basis of a long career of service to Shaw University as a teacher and field secretary and to the nation as a YWCA secretary.
