Doctor Jack Myers Speaks To Rocky Mount Academy Of Medicine

Rocky Mount — Dr. Jack Myers of the Duke University School of Medicine declared at a recent meeting of the Rocky Mount Academy of Medicine that the most outstanding contribution in the field of medicine in 1949-50 so far has been the discovery of the new drugs ACTH and Cortisone. Qualifying his statement further he stated that the drugs at the present time offered relief to patients suffering from many diseases which up to now had not reacted to any drug and even though the drugs did not cure the relief gained from the use of them was most gratifying.

Following his introduction to the society by Dr. John Smith of the Park View staff, Dr. Myers launched into a discussion bearing on the physiological bearing of the two drugs and showed by diagrams how these reactions in the body occurred. He listed the conditions which had responded favorably to the use of ACTH and Cortisone. He declared that probably the two unfavorable reactions to the use of the drugs might be declared the hypertension resulting from massive doses of them and the pseudo-diabetes resulting from extended use. He did say, however, that both of these reactions were reversible and that all of the cases showed a return to the normal state as soon or very shortly afterwards when the drug was withdrawn. The fact that those patients suffering from rheumatoid arthritis had showed remarkable improvement was evidence in itself that the drug's usefulness had not been fully explored as yet.

The speaker though warned his listeners that the cost of the drug was almost prohibitive to the average patient but it was firm belief that within a very short time the competition of the manufacturers would bring about a very great decline in the price of the two drugs.
