

Two And Half Million High School Dedicated At Houston, Texas

Houston, Texas — The trend of education for Negroes was developed here on Sunday by NEA public relations man, Mr. Moss H. Kendrick, in an address dedicating this city's new Phillips Wheatley Senior High School.

Calling the structure "the finest, per student capacity, in the land," Mr. Kendrick suggested that Wheatley high was a \$2,500,000 living monument to Miss Wheatley as well as a landmark to a half century of progress for the Negro people of the United States.

The speaker took the occasion to compliment the city of Houston for the erection of the school

which he pointed to as an outstanding example of "mutual cooperation and understanding on the part of the people of this Southwestern community."

"As we gather today," said Mr. Kendrick, "we cannot but remember that a segment of our American population at the time of its emancipation, just three-quarters of a century ago, was only five per cent literate. Today that segment of the population is more than 90 per cent literate."

"We will recall that during pre-Civil War days, in many sections of this region of the land, it was unlawful even to person of color to learning. Like-

wise, we will remember that superior to another child born under similar circumstances.

"Unfortunately, however, because of the lack of ability or desire, too many localities are neglecting their educational obligations to Negro boys and girls. Currently, people of my race in my home town, Atlanta, Georgia, are suing for the admittance of their children into all of the elementary and secondary schools of that city, because they feel that only through the abolition of segregated school patterns will their boys and girls receive equal educational opportunity."

The huge Testimonial will be held at the Mammoth Corpus Christi Auditorium, 4600 South Parkway, Sunday, October 29, 1950 at 3:00 P. M.

VOORHEES TIGERS PROVE TOO GREAT FOR SAINT PAUL

St. Paul, Minn. — The Voorhees Tigers led by the superb defensive play of "Geesh" Morris, guard, and Hemingway, tackle, together with the offensive power of "Chink" Williams, fullback, Robert McCray, halfback, and their two towering ends, Jordan and Pinckney were too much for the St. Paul Tigers.

Voorhees' first blood at the opening of the second quarter when a 30 yard pass from "Chink" Williams to Samuel Pinckney, right end, who caught it on the St. Paul's 25 yard line and went the rest of the way for the first tally. The conversion was no good.

St. Paul's got its first and only tally in the third quarter when a bad pass from center Jordan over the head of fullback Jordan of Voorhees and was covered in the end zone by Burt touchdown. The conversion was good and Voorhees led 13-6 with twelve minutes remaining.

St. Paul's came to life for a short period in the fourth quarter led by the line plunging and passing of Burt and Thompson but to no avail.

Registration Books Open For New Voters In State

Raleigh — Registration books will open throughout North Carolina on Saturday, October 14th, for the registration of new voters, and Chairman Everett Jordan of the State Democratic Executive Committee urged all Democrats who fall in this classification to register for the General Election on November 7th.

The registration books will be open on October 14th, 21st and 28th at the precinct polling places. Between those days registration is permitted at the home of the Registrar in each precinct.

Those who are entitled to register for this General Election are citizens who have reached the age of 21 years since the last voting and those who have completed one year of residence in the State and four months in the precinct.

Mr. Jordan called the matter of registration to the attention of all officials of the Democratic Party in the various counties and precincts in the hope that every citizen entitled to vote would take advantage of this opportunity and register for this privilege.

The County Chairman at the same time pointed out that absentee ballots may be used in this General Election. Civilians may make application for absentee ballots within 30 days

before General Election and not less than two days before the General Election. They must apply individually to the Chairman of the County Board of Elections in their respective counties.

Men and women in the military service may not only vote by mail but are also permitted to register temporarily by mail.
