Farm Training For Vets Moves Ahead In LaGrange During '51

LaGRANGE — On July 1st, 1950 the Veteran Farmer Training Program was initiated at the Frink High School, with an enrollment of 20 veterans and one veteran teacher.

Since that time, the program has developed and the enrollment has been increased to 124 veterans and six veteran teachers. This program is now under the supervision of the vocational agriculture teacher of the school, B. F. Hall, Jr.

The veteran program's accomplishments to date show immense progress in the farming communities with emphasis on better farming methods.

Areas that have been developed are: home improvement, home beautification, live-at-home program, livestock enterprise, and farm building improvements.

Twenty five percent of the veterans homes have been painted, lawns seeded and shrubs planted. Ninety percent has year-around gardens which furnish fresh vegetables for canning and immediate food for the table; adequate meat supply for the family is produced on most of the farms for their families; 12,000 baby chicks were purchased cooperatively in September and ninety percent was raised to broiler age.

The program boasts of purebred sows and purebred boars, high grade dairy cattle, a few beef animals, permanent pastures, clover crops, houses for livestock, and the latest recommended improved farming practices.

This veteran program is one of the youngest programs in the state and has the largest enrollment of any single Veteran Farmer Training Program.

The veteran teachers assisting Hall in this vast program are Paul L. Halsey, Samuel Moore, Jasper E. Ormond, Bruce Patterson, Maurice E. Reddick, and Dennis H. Tilford.

Georgia Man To Liberia On Point Four

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Another agricultural technician has been assigned to Liberia under the Point IV program, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced this week.

The new appointee is William T. Harris, former Extension agent of Brooks County, Ga. Accompanied by his wife and 12-year-old daughter, the agricultural specialist left recently for Monrovia, capital of West Africa Republic.

As an employee of the Technical Cooperation Administration, Harris will help to increase production of crops and livestock in Liberia. He is a graduate of Georgia State College, Savannah, Ga., and has done further work at Prairie View A. and M. College, Prairie View, Texas. His home is in Quitman, Ga.
