tract of worthwhile human relations. The teacher of human relations must be mature and well-balanced emotionally. You can't have this without the power of the higher path. The teacher must be reasonably adjusted in her own inter-personal human relations: Home, friendship and neighbors. The teacher must be free from undue inner tensions and conflicts. The teacher of human relations must leave the narrow path of littleness and walk on the "higher path" of love and cooperation.

I read the story of a young Negro teacher in Detroit who is skilled in the art of human relations. By virtue of his grace, charm, and friendliness he became a successful teacher in a white University. Then he moved into a white neighborhood. Bang! Bang! The response was highly charged with resentment and furious hatred. By an intelligent and courageous application of positive forces of love, the barriers finally fell and he was accepted. Love is the key of all great achievement; in human relations. Through love the teacher pointed a hostile community to a "still higher path".

The teachers of our children have the responsibility of leading the rising generation into the higher path of love and cooperation. God has the high way clearly marked for us. The teachers must lead our children into this "higher path" of love and peace.
