Columbia, S. C.—Defeat of a proposal to abolish the public school system in the State of South Carolina is urged by John Duffy, a columnist for the Gamecock, University of South Carolina student publication The move to abandon the school system was initiated by Gov.

James F. Byrnes as a result of the NAACP suit in the Claren-don County case to end segregation in the elementary and econdary schools.

This "fantastic" Byrnes pro-posal, Mr. Duffy says in his column of September 26, can be explained only as racial preju-dice. "Rather than mix races in the schools the state would abolish the schools," he asserts. "It does not matter how the people stand on the race issue. That is only incidental. The question is simply whether we shall allow ourselves to be so inflamed by the race issue that we shall work irreparable harm upon ourselves abolishing the school sys-

He calls upon students of the university to "influence our families and our friends to vote against the proposed amendment
