CHAPEL HILL

The Emancipation Day service, sponsored by the Council on Negro Affairs, was held at the First Baptist Church here, January 1. Highlight of the day included a colorful parade, headed by W. N. Sellars and Rev. J. R. Manley.

Other participants included the Northside Elementary School Band, Lincoln High School Band, the Mount Olive Lodge, No. 36, and Order of the Eastern Star, the Boy Scouts and other citizens of Chapel Hill. More than 300 attended the annual service.

Dr. G. D. Carnes, Grandmaster of Prince Hall Masons of North Carolina, and pastor of Mount Zion A. M. E. Church, Wilmington, was speaker for the day. Speaking on the subject, "Where Do We Go From Here," Dr. Carnes pointed out that we will first have to discover where we came from, and arrive at a purpose of being here.

"We came from the darkest days—slavery, we are living in a great state, a great state of happiness, said Dr. Carnes. He further stated that we have a future to build and it must be built with the help of God. "There's a place in the world for us if we make it," he asserted, "and we have got to make it. It takes motivating, thoughtful, Christian-hearted men to make the grade; men who believe in morality, charity and benevolence. Where we build on a moral and intellectual structure, the doors of opportunity stand open to us."
