\$20,000 And 25,000 Membership Goal

The N. C. Conference is now the fourth largest among the 40-odd states in which NAACP operates.

6th-the state board of directors, which will include elected and or delegated members from branches will meet in Greensboro for formally launching the year's work program.

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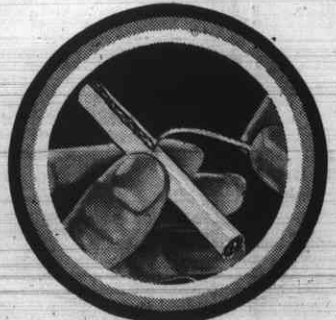
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
