BASKETBALL RACE AS OF FEBRUARY 16

The CIAA basketball race moves into its final stage next week. Although the final standings in visitation play and the awarding of tournament berths will not be decided until February 28, there is quite a battle being waged for the front position on February 21. For the results of games played through that date will determine which team will represent the CIAA at the National Association of Intercollegiate Basketball regional playoffs at Nashville on February 26-28. ruary 26-28.

The CIAA visitation (seasonal) championship is quite

a plum. With the privilege of representing the conference at what may be termed the National Negro Basketball Tournament (The NAIB play offs) also goes the chance to move on to Kansas City to play in the NAIB finals. For the winner of the tourney at Nashville, Tennessee February 26-28 will be selected as a member-at-large to play in the Kansas finals.

As was pointed out in last week's SPORTSBEAT, the seasonal championship is decided by the Dickinson rating system. We thought the SPORTSBEAT readers might be interested in the relative positions of the teams at his stage. (This is un-

official and is based on the records we have been able to obtain.)

First of all, to get the things off to a start, it was necessary to divide the teams into first and second divisions. To be first division, a team must have won more games than it has lost. There was one team with a 500 record—won the same number of games as those lost (7-7). In this case a special rule had to be applied. To be first Did the team play a third of its 14 games against first division opponents and did at least two (since there are no ties in basket-ball) end in wins? Both of these questions drew 'yes' answers. On the basis of the Dickinson System, the teams were placed as
