# **Negro Farmer** In Test With **New Peanuts**

Armistead Sharpe, a colored farmer of Harrellsville, has helped to test an experimental variety of peanuts by growing it on a demonstration plot, State Agent R. E. Jones of North Carolina Extension Service reorts.

On the demonstration plot,

Mr. Sharpe got a yield of 2,982 pounds of the new peanut variety per acre, compared with 2,290 pounds of Virginia Bunch variety which he had been growing all along.

The new variety, which was developed by the North Caro-lina Experimental Station, has been named N. C. 1; another experimental variety is known as N. C. 2. Mr. Sharpe and several other Negro farmers of Hert-ford County will plant 20 acres of N. C. 1 variety and five acres of N. C. 2 this spring for certification by the North Carolina

Not only did Mr. Sharpe get last year, but he also got a better price for it—\$12.47 per hundred pounds compared with \$11.40 for the Virginia Bunch
