## Dolphin There For Catching At Morehead

**FISHING IN NORTH CAROLINA**  
Gulf Steam Charter Boats Encounter Log-jam; Dolphin, Amberjack, King Mackerel Load Fish Boxes at Morehead, Nags Head; Ocean-bound Party Boat Puts Pier To Shame; Pierman Declares One-Man War On Shrimp; Hooking Beats Gigglin at Manteo; Preacher Learns About Beginner's Luck.

Charter boatmen along the North Carolina coast are all but flying the yellow flag of caution these days . . . as a warning to Gulf-Stream-anglers-to-be. The fishing's fine, but entirely too many would-be anglers are waiting until last minute to charter—or try to charter their boats. Bookings are filling fast, and many boatmen have their schedules filled for one month in advance. Morehead City, the state's most-fished port, has over fifty boats for charter for Gulf Stream use, and few of them are able to take parties without at least three weeks' notice. Oregon Inlet, Hatteras, Southport, and Shalotte . . . which also cater to big game fishermen, are having the same trouble. So the word has been passed from all ports: "Plan your trip early, and let your boatman be the first to know about it." Incidentally, most Gulf Stream at the time of booking. Off-shore boats . . . meaning the bluefish and mackerel operations . . . are more plentiful at most places, and are booked more sparingly, but a two-weeks' notice is recommended for even that type of trolling.

On the same day, Joe Tillson and party from Washington, D. C. and Greensboro, N. C., went out with Captain Kemp Wickizer on the "Shearwater." They brought back 10 amberjack, 15 king mackerel, and six dolphin. At Oregon Inlet it's dolphin time . . . and a West Virginia party can testify to what a fine time that is. Carl Williams, H. E. Gump, H. Hawn, S. H. Williams, and A. D. Williams, all of Morgantown, West Virginia, got 215 dolphin. They were fishing from the "Rita," captained by Dan Lewark.

Pier fishing has been slow during the week all along the coast, due to a rash of unfavorable winds . . . but the winds haven't stopped J. P. Miller . . . captain of the "Ella Dee" from raking in the bottom fish as he operates from the end of Kure Pier at Kure Beach. The boat operates as a party boat—wherein anglers pay a modest fee each and get a half-day's fishing some twelve miles offshore in return. On Saturday morning, seventeen hopefuls were aboard, and each one returned to the end of the pier with a minimum of 25 pounds of fish . . . assorted species. The "Ella Dee," incidentally, is one of the few boats in the world that operates from a pier in the ocean. Throughout her whole season, she never sees a sound, river, or other "inside" body of water. Her mooring spot is over 800 feet offshore, where the pier stops.
