"In the township of Stanley," the complaint points out, "white children attend a consolidated high school; this school has modern building, equipment, athletic field, gymnasium, and school buses...while Negro students...are compelled to attend a three room frame building with two teachers, the Dallas elementary school seven miles away, and the Highland high school of Gastonia, 12 miles away."

wound was in his forehead. The elder Wall was reported suffering from severe shock and a paralysis he had developed from an earlier stroke.

At Mount Olive in Duplin County Saturday night, two brothers fell into an argument over money and when it was over, one of them lay dead.

Mincey Royal, 38, was found shot to death Saturday night at his home around 9:30 p. m. His younger brother, Granger, 27, is being held for the slaying.

Funeral services for Mincey were scheduled for Wednesday at the Royal home. They were the sons of Mr. and Mrs. Cleveland Royal.

Around midnight, Saturday, a 32-year-old man was shot to death by a white storekeeper near Clinton in the Honeycutt township of Sampson County after an argument over payment of a grocery bill.

Theodore Newman, white storekeeper, told Sampson County Coroner Dr. J. S. Ayers that Warren Harding Williams, whose address was given as Route 1, Salemburg, came into his store

on Saturday night and bought groceries. An argument ensued over payment, and, according to Newman, Williams left, then returned waving a .22 calibre pistol at him.

Newman said he grabbed a shot gun and forced Williams out of the store, but Williams, after going a few feet, got out of a car and started toward the store again, shooting several

times at the doorway. As he was about to enter, Newman blasted him in the left eye, killing him instantly.
