### Plans Discussed For Integrating Probation Officers' Meet In '55

DURHAM  
The success of the first annual Institute for Probation Officers and Workers sponsored by North Carolina College's Summer School and the National Probation and Parole Association may lead to an expanded and integrated institute for 1955.

That was the word of Dr. Charles E. King, NCC sociology professor, who directed the institute that lasted a week-long session in Durham last week. The 1955 session may open up to all interested probation workers in the entire Southeast, Dr. King said.

Two NCC faculty members, Dr. J. S. Himes, Jr., professor of sociology, and Dr. Carol C. Bowie, professor of psychology, were among local consultants at the institute. They were assisted in the institute program by Tully McCrea, NPPA regional consultant of Austin, Tex.

Judge W. Lawson Moore of the Juvenile Court of Durham and Durham County and James Waite, director of the Butler Youth Service, were among discussion leaders.

Sixteen of the 18 probation workers represented in North Carolina, while Mrs. Jim Etta Lee, Alson, La., and Amos Beck, Pensacola, Fla., were out-of-state delegates.

McCrea, former director of the juvenile probation office in New Orleans, La., stressed the need for professionally trained probation workers as "an economical move both in terms of dollars and cents and in terms of human values."

He said any kind of "segregation, whether by race or by sex" is "invariably costly", and he emphasized that segregation is especially costly in the South, "a region that can least afford the expense of maintaining separate institutions for various races or for boys and girls". McCrea told an interviewer, "The problem of juvenile delinquency is nation-wide and it exists among virtually all groups and with boys and girls alike."

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### N. C. Masonic Council Meets

The Annual Meeting of the North Carolina Council of Debarment was held Sunday, June 20 at the Masonic Temple in Durham with James T. Diggs, executive director, presiding. Dr. J. W. V. Cordice of Durham Consistory No. 218, gave the welcome address. Response was given by Frank C. Hester of Newbern Consistory No. 30, the oldest member. Mr. Hester has been a Mason for 69 years.

The supreme council officers were introduced and committees were appointed. During his discourse, he admonished the brothers about the changing world conditions and advised them to strengthen the bonds of brotherhood, so as to be prepared for any emergency which may arise.

Following the address, the delegation assembled in the Jade Room of the Donut Shop for dinner served by the local consistory. Officers were elected and installed following the dinner hour and the meeting place for next year was chosen. Fayetteville will be host to the council next year.

### CIO Secretary Pledges To Support NAACP

DALLAS, TEX.  
In the "exciting and enduring struggle" to build an America of economic abundance, security and strengthened civil rights, the Congress of Industrial Organization--through its Secretary-Treasurer James B. Carey--pledged its full support to the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and other liberal-minded groups.

In a speech prepared for delivery to the 45th Annual Convention of the NAACP, Mr. Carey--who heads the CIO Civil Rights Committee--hailed the Supreme Court decision on school segregation which, he said, "unanimously and resoundingly proclaimed anew that our Constitution is color blind." America has "witnessed the validity of the basic pre-

mise of our democracy," Mr. Carey said.  
The CIO officer said that "America has been breathing new life into our Constitution. The intolerable gap between promise and performance is slowly being closed...speeded by the pressures of world leadership."

Mr. Carey said the "CIO is proud to have been associated with you (of the NAACP) in the struggle" against school segregation laws. He said the NAACP "has taken the leadership in forging the law into an instrument of social precision to accomplish these objectives. You have developed a sharp and polished tool. This tool is showing the world how to accomplish a legal revolution without bloodshed."

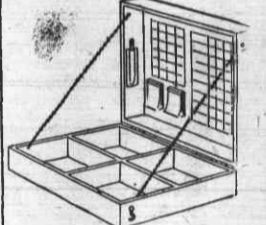
Noting that America's free trade unions have been "a mighty force" in the progress towards strengthened democratic institutions, Mr. Carey said that "most unions have now learned that their economic and moral position is strengthened under equal standards of pay, hiring, promoting and lay-offs. Your program has helped us in this job."

### Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS

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Use scrap lumber to form the framework of the two sections. For the top and bottom, use Masonite Presdwood. Dividers may be the same material. A hook and eye keep the business portion of the desk fastened to the wall section when folded.  
A piece of 1/4" Presdwood inserted between the two sections will provide a convenient writing surface and serve also to keep the contents of the lower half from spilling when the desk is in its closed position.

NOTICE OF CHANGE IN THE NAME OF THE MANGUM PRECINCT TO THE MANGUM URMSTEAD PRECINCT AND THE HILLSIDE SCHOOL PRECINCT TO WHITTLED SCHOOL PRECINCT

Notice to the Public is hereby given that the Durham County Board of Elections, at a special meeting held June 15, 1954, adopted a resolution changing the name of Mangum Precinct to Mangum-Urmstead Precinct and that of Hillside School Precinct to Whittled School Precinct, effective July 25, 1954, for the reasons:

(1) That within the confines of the present Mangum Precinct one and one-half miles apart are located the birthplaces of U. S. Senator Willie M. Mangum (1831-1853) and of U. S. Senator William B. Umstead (1846-1948), a fact of such unusual occurrence as to entitle it to have permanent recognition, which will be achieved through this giving to history their names jointly associated with the precinct which gave them birth.

(2) The Hillside School, for which the Hillside Precinct was named, has been changed to the Whittled School, and in order to avoid confusion, the name of the precinct will now conform to the name of the school.

NOW THEREFORE in accordance with the said resolution so adopted and to give legal effect thereto, forty days notice will be hereby given that on and after July 25, 1954, Mangum Precinct in Mangum Township, Durham County, will be known as Mangum-Urmstead Precinct; and Hillside School Precinct, in Durham Township, Durham County, on and after July 25, 1954, will be known as Whittled School Precinct.
