### \$37,000 Drive Conducted By 4-H Club Foundation Of North Carolina Will End On Saturday, May 28

GREENSBORO — A drive for \$37,000, conducted by the 4-H Club Foundation of North Carolina and aimed at the completion of the 4-H Club Camp at Hammocks Beach in Onslow County, will draw to a close here on Saturday, May 28.

W. C. Cooper, 4-H Club specialist with the A&T College Extension Service, who is in charge of the drive, stated this week that more than \$37,000 has already been raised but a like amount is still required to complete the project, on which construction has already begun. The present resources were contributed, primarily, by 4-H Club boys and girls and their parents.

The camp facilities will include accommodations for 150 persons per week or approximately 1,800 during a camping season. Among the proposed structures are: dining and recreation building, administration building, bath houses for boys and girls and 8 cabins, each accommodating 18 persons. The 3 mile beach front affords adequate bathing and swimming facilities.

The current drive concludes with a "4-H Club Camp Day" on May 28. Uniformed club members and their leaders will be soliciting funds all during the day in the 52 counties where Negro Extension work is conducted. The reports will be

ed and wired in after 6:00 P. M., to the state headquarters here at A&T College.

The drive has received statewide endorsement. State Grange Master, Harry B. Caldwell, Greensboro, stated this week. "The Negro 4-H Club members, their parents and leaders are to be commended for the excellent beginning. Continued support of this project is imperative to assure success of this urgently needed camp."

R. Flake Shaw, also of Greensboro and executive vice president of the North Carolina Farm Bureau Federation, stated that the objectives of the 4-H Club camp program are identical with those of the Farm Bureau and urged the entire membership of his organization to support it.

The project has also received the full endorsement of the county commissioners in the 52

counties and the sanction of L. Y. Ballentine, Raleigh, state commissioner of agriculture who stated that the camp will fill a long felt need in the State's rural youth program.

Following the Apostles' Creed led by the college chaplain and a brief biography of the Rt. Rev. Thomas Atkinson, Dr. Boyer will mention briefly the articles to be placed in the cornerstone, and the following articles will be deposited:

A copy of the Bible, the Rev. Samuel D. Rudder, college chaplain; a copy of the Book of Common Prayer, the Rev. Robert J. Johnson, college trustee; a copy of the college catalog, Johnny Horton, president of the Alumni Association; a copy of the minutes showing the authorization of funds for the building, W. J. Trent, Jr., executive director, United College Fund, and the Rev. George M. Plaskett, secretary to the board of trustees; a copy of the Pen, James P. Lachart, president of the Student Council; a copy of the biographical sketch of Bishop Atkinson, Joseph B. Cheshire; a copy of Proceedings, the Rev. James McDowell Dick, chairman of the Building Committee; and a photograph of Bishop Atkinson, Mrs. Paul Green, descendant of Bishop Atkinson.

After the singing of a hymn, Bishop Penick, the Clergy, and others will go to the corner where the stone is to be laid for completion of the ceremonies.

The Rev. Dick will present the trowel to Bishop Penick who, assisted by the builders, will lay the stone.

The Monday program calls for a welcome address by Dr. W. E. Reed, dean, School of Agri-

culture at the college and speeches by Mrs. Ida Duncan, Reidsville, president, North Carolina Teachers Association; Mrs. Idell J. Randall, Greensboro, 4-H Club specialist; Miss Barbara J. Wilson, Bahama president, N. C. Association of New Homemakers and district eliminations in public speaking, quartette-singing, quiz and talent contests among the boys.

On Tuesday, W. J. Kennedy, Jr. president of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company will deliver the keynote address. The schedule also calls for the awarding of the Honorary Farmer Degrees for outstanding achievement, finals in the livestock judging contest and a tour of the city and campus.

The meeting concludes on Wednesday following an address by E. Y. Floyd, Raleigh, director, Plant Food Institute, and the presentation of awards to state winners in the various contests.

W. T. Johnson, assistant supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, is advisor to the organization.
