According to Dr. I. Phillips Frohman, Chairman, Section of General Practice, American Medical Association, "... after a hearty meal, there's nothing like a good hot cup of fragrant tea. Unlike other beverages which contain volatile oils which retard digestion, tea's tannins (not to be confused with tannic acid) aid digestion. That's why tea with meals leaves you with a just right feeling—not a feeling of having eaten too much..."

Another important hit of information we hunted up is that unless you use boiling water and I teaspoonful or I teabag per cup, and let it brew from 3-5 minutes, you're forfeiting all the good in the tea leaves. Don't stint on the amount of tea you use, or the length of brewing time. If you like weak tea—add piping hot water after the brewing period.

Another idea we've hunted up for a meal-in-minutes is Yam Crowned Ham Slice. All you need shop for is M-inch slice of harm, a small can of crushed pineapple, and a No. 2 can of yams. While you're at the market, be sure you have plenty of tea on hand. It comes in M-pound (48-50 cups) and M-pound packages (69-100 cups) in both loose tea or teabags. WASHINGTON, D. C. Information for parents on rheumatic fever in children is contained in a booklet, "The Child with Rheumatic Fever" issued by the Children's Bureau U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.
