### Fayetteville Teacher Gets Study Leave

Odell Uzzell, Dean of Men and Instructor in Sociology, has been granted a year's leave of absence to accept a Special Danforth Fellowship to study toward the doctorate at the Ohio State University during the 1957-58 school year. The A and T College will begin its sixty-sixth school year on Monday, September 9.

A special Freshman Orientation Committee, headed by William H. Gamble, has arranged a program for the new students which will keep them busy from early morning to late in the afternoon, all aimed at giving the youngsters charted starts on their college careers. Gamble said that arrangements have been made to receive the freshmen all day on Sunday, September 8.

Sixteen groups, of approximately 50 students each, will be organized at a general assembly of all freshmen scheduled for 8:00 A.M., on Monday. They will move together as groups during most of the week for physical examinations, placement tests in English and mathematics, guidance tests and official photographs. Evening sessions have been scheduled for conferences with

personnel deans and advisors. The otherwise steady grind will be enlivened with a Freshman Jollification on Friday evening, September 13; the annual All-Freshman Worship Service and the President's reception for freshmen, both on Sunday, September 15 and the annual Freshman Talent Night on Friday, September 20.

A special reception committee headed by Miss June Williams, St. Augustine, Fla., "Miss A and T" and Alexander Gardner, New Bern, president of the student body, will be on hand to welcome the new enrollees. Freshmen will register all day on Wednesday, September 11 and upperclassmen will register on the following day.

### Program For Doctors Clinic Is Announced

Dr. Clyde Donnell, vice president and medical director of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company and president of Lincoln Hospital here, last night announced the tentative program of the 12th annual post graduate clinic to be conducted at Lincoln Wednesday, October 23.

Six doctors are listed for discussions under "Medical and Surgical Complications in Pregnancy." Speakers and their subjects are: Dr. E. Orgain, "Control and Treatment of Heart Disease"; Dr. William Nicholson, "Control and Treatment of Diabetes"; Dr. Wayne

Rundles, "Control and Treatment of Anemia"; Dr. R. N. Creadick, "Diagnosis and Treatment of Emotional Reactions"; Dr. William Shingleton, "Diagnosis and Treatment of Acute and Chronic Surgical Conditions" and Dr. William A. Nalyn, "Acute Infectious Disease with Reference to the Effect on the Fetus."
