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come effective until the afore-
said irresponsible motorist al-
ready had killed or injured
someone, or destroyed property.
It gave him one accident "for
free." So in 1957 the Legislature
passed the Compulsory Act.

State officials and the public
generally should realize that
there will be many loud walls of
protests when people go to buy
their 1958 license tags, between
January 1 and February 15.
When some automobile owners
finally realize that they can't
buy their license plates, and
operate their cars, until they buy

insurance, they are going to
scream. When they realize that
instead of spending \$10 for a li-
cense tag they must pay upward
of \$40 for the license and in-
surance, every legislator who
voted for the new law will be
subject to attack. But a little
later on, when people are in-
volved in accidents with irres-
ponsible motorists who have in-
surance only because they were
forced to buy it, those same
legislators should be the recipi-
ents of praise—from the accident
victims, at least.

Whether the commendation
will overcome the criticism only
time will tell. The first show-
down should be during the 1958
primaries and election. The
second will come when the 1959
Legislature begins its session.

In the meantime, those who
try to be open-minded might
consider these two things. Mas-
sachusetts has had such a law
for more than thirty years and
though it is not as comprehen-
sive as the North Carolina law,
and though it has been the sub-
ject of many political attacks,
every effort to repeat the Mas-
sachusetts law has failed. More-
over, the New York law, on
which the North Carolina law is
based, apparently 'has proven


