# **Cemetery Caretaker Kills** Spouse, Takes Own Life

WINSTON-SALEM—A 38 year-old cemetery caretaker, apparently ovecome by blind rage, shot his wife to death while three of his children looked on in frozen horror, then walked out of his house to the garage and ended his own life with a shot gun blast to the head.

The double slaying took the lives of Mrs. Emma Lee Miller and her husband, Luther Miller late last Friday night. It left without parents six children, ranging in ages from 20 to 12

An aura of funereal silence settled over the neat Miller residence on New Walkertown Road as poker-faced ambulance attendants carried the bodies from the house to waiting ambulances.
