MAY GARDEN REMINDERS

Spray and dust: Insects multiply during spring months. Keep spraying and dusting program in high gear to stay ahead of garden pests.

Much: Summer's heat is just around the corner. Start spreading mulch around plants to cut way down on watering chores.

Lawns: In many areas mowing chores have been going on for several weeks now. Take time out to check the mower for loose nuts, a dull blade, or a dirty oil filter.

Shrubs and trees: Rose slugs are likely to make their first appearance this month. Look for soft, jelly-like bodies or signs that they've been there, skeletonized leaves on rose bushes. To control them, dust or spray with a multi-purpose rose preparation.

Annuals, perennials, and bulbs: Where early annuals are beginning to grow, cultivate carefully to avoid damage to tender and shallow roots.

At least two high ranking officials of national Shrinehood will take part in the proceedings. Imperial Potentate Booker Alexander will be on hand for the convention and a public meeting at Martin Street Baptist Church will be addressed by Imperial High Priest John Henry Hester.

The convention's lighter side will see the staging of the Potentate's Ball at Memorial Auditorium Friday night, scheduled from ten p. m. until two a. m. a drill contest Saturday morning at ten and a parade beginning at noon Saturday.

A fast growing popular and colorful feature of Shrine convention; the drill competition will see units from Winston-Salem, Charlotte and Durham, among others, put through fast paced maneuvers at Shaw University's Spaulding gymnasium Saturday morning.
