while whites were served, has never left her memory, and in later life, with her publisher-husband L. C. Bates, has campaigned against segregation, discrimination, police brutality, and all forms of man's inhumanity to man.

The final entry of the Little Rock Nine climaxed the pressure Mrs. Bates, as the state NAACP head, had kept on the school board since 1954 until the

court approved the gradual integration plan. On one occasion in early 1957, when she learned Negro students were being discouraged, she told Superintendent Virgil Blossom, "Well, we've got 215 kids. You can take the cream of the crop or you can take all of them." The school board approved 17, but eight withdrew before the National Guard was called to prevent their entering.
