AME Zion Bishops Attack Governor Of South Carolina On Bias Issue

COLUMBIA, S. C. — Two bishops of the AME Zion Church who closed Conferences in the state last week blasted Governor Timmerman and others whom they termed as hate-mongers for the part they have played in failing to integrate the schools of the commonwealth.

At Nan Wyck, Bishop R. L. Jones told the members of the Pec Dec Conferences, along with a crowd that packed White Oak AME Zion Church, Sunday, that every Negro in the state should not be content until every vestige of second class citizenship had been removed. He warned them that it should not be done in a spirit of hate, but should be done with prayerful thinking and a humble heart.

The prelate told the audience that when they are asked about sending their children to so-called white schools that they should answer by saying, "I don't know what you mean by white schools, but I intend to send my child to the nearest school to my home." He also admonished them that the democratic way of life was a two-way street and that if they wanted first class citizenship they would have to accept the responsibilities that go with that station in life.

He told them that first class citizenship meant giving a full day's work for a full day's pay and paying all of the obligations that a first class citizen was supposed to pay. He further said it meant that they should live decent lives and obey the laws as set out by the nation and the

state. He called upon them to give their money, clean up their homes and bodies and to rear their children in the fear of the Lord and the respect of the rights of others.

Election Results Seen Favorable For C-R Legislation

NEW YORK — The results of the elections, viewed as a whole, are encouraging to the advocate of civil rights and "may enhance the possibility of securing an effective

anti-filibuster rule in the Senate at the opening of the 86th Congress," Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secretary, said here Friday in a post-election statement.

The NAACP leader also indicated that "the chances of rejecting proposals to curb the Supreme Court may have been improved" as a result of the election inasmuch as some of the strongest advocates of such legislation will not be returning to Congress.

The partial text of Wilkins' statement follows: The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is heartened by the election results which it views, on the whole, as a triumph for liberalism and an affirmation of civil rights.

The election may enhance the possibility of securing an effective anti-filibuster rule in the Senate at the opening of the 83th Congress. Likewise, the chances of rejecting proposals to curb the Supreme Court may have

been much improved.
