Miss Jackson, 17, was picked from among 50 contestants by a jury of fashion experts and civic leaders at the Renaissance Ballroom here on Halloween Night, October 31.

Miss Townsend, who later was crowned "Miss Negro Press Photographers' Ball of 1958," won the best-dressed award for her formal gown in peau de soie fabric and combination cape-overskirt made of the same material with a lining of shimmering white metallic fabric. Approximately 41 persons are expected to travel by chartered bus from Durham to the Baltimore Colts-Los Angeles Rams professional football game in Baltimore Sunday, Nov. 23.

The trip is being sponsored by the newly formed "Boosters Club," an organization of sports fans.

According to Edward Boyd, president of the new group, the bus to Baltimore will leave Durham Sunday morning at six and return to Durham late the same evening.

CIAA Title Rides On Outcome Of A&T-NCC Turkey Day Game

The football teams of North Carolina A&T and North Carolina College meet at Durham Athletic Park here Thanksgiving Day in the 27th annual Carolina Classic.

Kickoff time is 1:30 p.m. This game could settle the 1958 CIAA football championship.

Bert Piggott's Aggies, preseason favorites to run away with the loop diadem were playing second fiddle to Herman Riddick's Cinderella Eagles last week.

The Eagles with a 5-0-0 count and a Dickinson of 26.00 were ahead of the Aggies with their 4-0-0 and a Dickinson of 22.50.

The game threatens to be a battle of titans.

Howie Smith, Aggie quarterback known for his daring running and passing, will be pitted against the Eagle combination of captain Lloyd Eason and Ike "The Whip" Gatling.

The Aggies' heavy line will outweigh the Eagles lighter forward wall. This factor could prove decisive.

NCC mentors have experienced considerable success this season in alternating two lines of virtually even ability. Outstanding on the Aggie

front line are Lorenzo Stanford, 240 lbs., and Melvin Richardson, 298 lbs., both tackles, Harvey Stewart, 196 lb. guard and Burline McQueen, 205 lb end.

Teaming with Smith in the Aggie backfield are a trio of highly dangerous runners and passers in Ed Nesbitt, Charles Debose and Eddie Godbolt.

In addition to the quarterback twosome of Eason and Gatling, the Eagles have some of the CIAA's most brilliant backs in Clifton "Sattelite" Jackson, senior All America candidate from Hampton, Va., Hadel Joyner, power driving halfback from Williamston, N.C., a duo of rugged ends in George Wallace, Williamsburg, Va., junior and Paul Winslow, Weaksville, N.C., junior.
