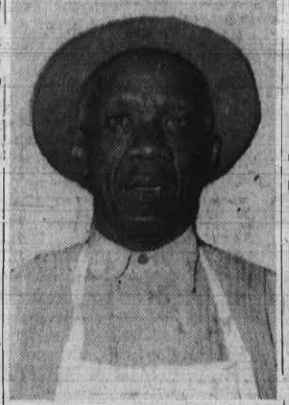
Funeral services were held on Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. at Bethany Presbyterian church here and interment was in the church cemetery.

Negro Women's Council Reveals Plan For Memorial To Mrs. Bethune

WASHINGTON, D. C. Dorothy I. Height, President of the National Council of Negro Women announced Council plan recently for erecting a Freedom memorial to Mary McLeod Bethune, founder of the organization. The announcement came at the National Council was adjourning its 23rd Annual Conference at their Council House 1318 Vermont Avenue, N.W.

Tentative plans call for the memorial to be located in Lincoln Park. It would be the first statue erected in honor of a Negro in the Nation's Capital.

The unveiling of the Bethune Memorial on January 1, 1963 would coincide with the 100th anniversary of Negro freedom gained when Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation in 1863.

The proposed memorial will be under the administration of the NCNW Educational Foundation which will oversee the mo-

mentous project. It will be financed by a mass fund raising campaign aimed primarily at Negro women throughout the nation. They will be asked to give a penny for each year of freedom since the historic signing of the Proclamation during the Civil War.
