

### Over 7,000 Live Life Of A&T Students For Day

GREENSBORO  
More than 7,000 school boys and girls from throughout North Carolina, border points in Virginia and South Carolina were here Saturday, November 15 for annual High School Day at A&T College.

The exact total of 7,837 youngsters, nearly 1,000 more than last year's record turnout, swarmed about the campus participating in a well scheduled program arranged for them.

They visited laboratories, classrooms and laboratories and saw how A&T students live, study and learn. Special demonstrations and exhibits in chemistry, physics, agriculture, home economics, technical industries and engineering were on review for the visitors.

The youngsters consumed at the luncheon meal more than 8,000 lbs. of turkey, 800 loaves of bread, 1,500 lbs. of green vegetables and 10,000 ice cream servings. Many also remained for dinner.

They yelled themselves hoarse, rooting for their favorite Aggies who rolled over Virginia State College 34-6 in the football game, and applauded demonstrations by the bands from Virginia State and A&T. The Army ROTC drill team also entertained them during the football halftime.

### NAACP Joins In Push To Limit Senate Debate

WASHINGTON, D. C.  
The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has joined 16 other national organizations in calling upon Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson "to support a new Rule 22 at the opening of the Senate of the 86th Congress so that majority rule may once again prevail in our national legislature."

In a letter addressed to the Texas Democrat, made public here last week, the organizations urged rejection of the "compromise" proposal to reinstate a cloture rule providing for a vote of two-thirds of senators present and voting. This proposal, they branded, "a spurious compromise" which "simply uses new language to freeze the present rule and thus condemn meaningful civil rights legislation to the filibuster dungeons where past proposals have perished."

Roy Wilkins signed the letter on behalf of the NAACP. Other signers included Walter Ruther, UAW; James B. Carey, IUE; Joseph L. Rauh, Jr., ADA; Patrick Malin, ACLU; A. Philip Randolph, Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters; and Jacob S. Aronson, Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America.

### Negro Methodist Colleges Need Six Million

NASHVILLE, TENN.  
The 13 Negro colleges related to The Methodist Church need at least \$6,000,000 for building and equipment. They also need additional funds for teachers' salaries, scholarships, and endowment.

This information is in a report to be published soon by the Commission on Christian Higher Education of The Methodist Church. It was announced here by the Rev. Dr. John O. Gros, Nashville, director of the commission.

The 13 Methodist-related Negro schools that benefited from the annual offering are Dillard University, New Orleans; Bennett College, Greensboro, N. C.; Bethune-Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Fla.; Claflin College, Orangeburg, S. C.; Clark College, Atlanta; Paine College, Augusta, Ga.; Huston-Tillotson College, Austin, Texas; Philander Smith College, Little Rock, Ark.; Rust College, Holly Springs, Miss.; Morehouse College, Marshall, Texas; Gammon Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga.; and Meharry Medical School, Nashville, Tenn.

### Shaw University Teacher Helps Revamp Baptist School Literature

One of the biggest contributions to the improvement of Baptist Sunday School literature is due to a Shaw University teacher.

Miss McTyre began the chore in June, 1957, when the Publishing Board decided to inaugurate the improvement program.

During the summer of 1957, she spent three months working on experimental literature with the children's writers of the Board in Nashville, Tenn.

Along with a staff of writers, she attended the Christian writers workshop at the American Baptist Assembly at Greent Lake, Wisconsin.

Miss Emma Melton, now a senior major in Religious Education at Shaw, served as secretary for the project.

Since 1957, Miss McTyre has continued to serve as a consultant to the program and as a contributor to the Children's Teacher Quarterly. During the summer of 1958, she edited all of the materials of the Children's Division for the Fourth Quarter. These materials are used currently in some 16,000 church schools served by the Sunday School Publishing Board.

School officials, commenting on Miss McTyre's work with the publishing board, said this week:

"Shaw University is happy that a member of its faculty is making this significant contribution to the work of the National Baptist Convention. Many of the churches which support the program of the University are members of this convention and use this literature. This participation is in keeping with the University's efforts at identifying itself with supporting, and helping to realize Baptist objectives, on the state and national levels."

Miss McTyre has been active in various Baptist programs locally and nationally for many years. During the summer of 1958, she attended the world convention on Christian Education in Tokyo.

As head of the University's
