Slavery Of Race Hate Worst Kind, Shaw Founder's Day Told

RALEIGH — Shaw University's Ninety-third Founder's Day was observed on Friday, November 21, with the traditional graveside ceremony at the tomb of the Founder, Henry Martin Tupper.

"Miss Shaw University," represented by Shirley Frances Parker, a senior of Newton Grove, and a business education major, placed the wreath upon the grave of the founder. Following this ceremony, the anniversary service was held in University Church.

The principal speaker for the occasion was Dr. James L. Martin, physician of Philadelphia, and a 1806 graduate of the Shaw University Leonard Medical School.

In reviewing the history of the school, the speaker cited conditions which existed in 1865. He stated that there were about 8,000,000 ex-slaves who had been brainwashed for over 200 years, ignorant, irresponsible, illiterate and bewildered.

In this atmosphere and such adverse conditions Henry Martin Tupper sought to improve the Negro when he founded Tupper Institute, which was the name given to the beginning of Shaw University.

In recounting the history of the persecutions of the founder, and his sacrifices, the speaker asked, "Have we lived in such a way as to merit his sacrifice?"

From Tupper Institute, Shaw University has developed a School of Medicine, pharmacy, law, religion, liberal arts, which, he said, certainly justifies her existence.

"The world is fast learning," he said, "that of all forms of slavery, there is none so harmful and degrading as the form of slavery which tempts one human being to hate another by reason of his race."

In any country, regardless of what its laws say, wherever people act upon the idea that the disadvantage of one man is the good of another, there sla-
