U. S. Agriculture Dept. Seeks To Buy Grapefruit

WASHINGTON, D. C. — The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced an offer to buy canned grapefruit sections, packed from the 1958-59 crop, for use in the National School Lunch Program.

Purchases will be made with funds appropriated under the National School Lunch Act and will depend upon quantities and prices offered.

Details and specifications of the offer to purchase are now being mailed to grapefruit canners.

Offers to sell canned grapefruit sections must be received by the Director, Fruit and Vegetable Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington 25, D. C., by 9 a.m. (EST) Dec. 9, for acceptance not later than Dec. 12.

USDA will require deliveries between Dec. 29, 1958, and Feb.
