Pamphlet On Adoption Advises Parents To Be Certain Of Their Reasons For Wanting Children

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A revised edition of "When You Adopt A Child" has just been issued by the Children's Bureau.

The pamphlet urges prospective adoptive parents to be sure of their reasons for wanting to adopt a child before they begin seeking one.

"Adoption should never take place unless the child is more than a means of meeting your needs," the pamphlet states. "A child is a person. He has needs of his own. And he has rights."

Counseling parents to give up all idea of finding a child without help, the pamphlet asserts: "Freelancing doesn't pay in adoption. Go to a good licensed or approved adoption or child-placing agency. You want a child with whom you will be happy and who will be happy with you. Turn thumbs down on any offer that is not made by a first rate agency."

A new section in this guide for parents suggests that couples who want to adopt children from abroad should get in touch with social agencies to help with these adoptions, as with any other. The publication gives some advice on

citizenship and birth certificate needs of the child adopted from abroad.

Marinading Small Meat Cuts Adds To Success In Outdoor Cooking

Many devotees of outdoor barbecue cooking have found that marinating such meats as club steaks, lamb chops and other small cuts before cooking adds greatly to their flavor.

For chefs who don't already have their favorite marinade recipes, home economists at Arvin Industries, a major manufacturer of outdoor grills, suggest the following:

1 1/2 cups olive oil
1/2 cup soy sauce
1/2 cup Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons dry mustard
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon black pepper
1/2 cup red wine
1 1/2 teaspoons dried parsley flakes

2 tablespoons minced onion
1/3 cup lemon juice
This makes about three cups of sauce.

Meat should be covered completely with the sauce and chilled in the refrigerator overnight. Turn the meat once or twice. After draining the meat, let it come to room temperature before barbecuing. Store the marinade in a tightly covered jar in the refrigerator for use again.

This sauce also can be used to baste meat on a shish kebob while it is cooking. Use a brush to apply the sauce to the meat during the last few minutes it is being cooked.
