

## Founder's Day Hears Franklin

TUSKEGEE, Ala. — Dr. John Hope Franklin, Chairman of the Department of History, Brooklyn College, will deliver the Founder's Day Address at Tuskegee Institute, Sunday, March 22.

This is one of the Institute's major annual events which follows the Spring Meeting of the Board of Trustees convening on Monday, day, March 21.

Dr. Franklin has taught at Fisk University, St. Augustine's College, and North Carolina College at Durham. In 1947 he became professor of history, Howard University, a position from which he resigned in 1956 to become professor and visiting professor in several American universities, including Harvard University, the University of Wisconsin, Cornell University and the University of California at Berkeley.

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## Norfolk's Mrs. William T. Mason Urges Bennett College Students Not to Become Delightful "Wastrels," to Lose Fear of Living

GREENSBORO — Bennett College students were urged to prepare to live "dangerous and full lives" rather than "placid and safe lives" by Mrs. William T. Mason, of Norfolk, Va., in her address before the third session of the 33rd annual Homemaking Institute, here Wednesday.

Mrs. Mason, a public relations consultant, and former president of the National Council of Negro Women, in listing the types of per-

sons to be found in a community, also referred to the "charming wastrels" and the "just plain wastrels."

"The charming wastrels," she said, "are those egocentrics wrapped up in their bridge and poker games and their fine homes and cars who can shed tears about the orphans thousands of miles away but who do not lift a finger to help the unfortunate and underprivileged in their own communities."

"The plain wastrels are not concerned about anything. Their contribution is that they serve as horrible examples of what one must not allow himself to become."

Mrs. Mason reminded the students that they are merely serving an apprenticeship in preparation for "a great performance in your local communities." She urged them to develop a sound philosophy which will give meaning to their lives.

The institute opened on Sunday with an address by Mrs. Julia E. Mensah, of Ibadan, Nigeria, who told of the increasing leadership roles being played by African women generally and by Nigerian women in particular.

A panel discussion of "Women in Careers and in the Home" featured the Monday session and a point of agreement was that ca-

reers and marriage can be mixed successfully. Panelists included Mrs. Lillian Snipes, local beauty shop owner; Mrs. Sarah Herbin, associate director of merit employment of the Southeastern region of the American Friends Service Committee; Dr. Lyvonne M. Washington, dentist of Winston-Salem; Mrs. Alice Dunnigan, chief of the Washington bureau of the Associated Negro Press, and P. L. Grandison, chief of counseling services at Bennett.

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## Jamesena Chalmers, Bennow Wilson Fellowship Fayetteville, Gets Woodrett Senior From

GREENSBORO — Miss Jamesena Chalmers, of Fayetteville, a senior English major at Bennett College, was notified this week that she is among 1,200 superior American and Canadian students who have been named Woodrow Wilson Fellows for the academic year 1959-60. Miss Chalmers, who will enroll in the graduate division of Syracuse University in the fall, is the first Bennett College representative to be so honored.

The Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation of Princeton, N. J., each year conducts a nationwide talent hunt for future college teachers and supports promising scholars for their first year of graduate work. The project is backed by a \$25 million grant from the Ford Foundation.

This year's fellows were chosen from 7,000 candidates, all nominated and all rigorously screened by committees of faculty members. These candidates came from over 700 undergraduate colleges. Each fellow receives a living allowance of \$1,500, plus the full cost of tuition and fees.
