## Durham Group Denied Service At Bus Station

A delegation of Durham youth enroute to Washington, D. C. to take part in a mass demonstration urging speedy integration ran afoul of segregation practices at two points on their route.

Some 40 Durham youngsters and four adult chaperones, represented the city in the "Youth March for Integrated Schools" in the nation's capital last Saturday.

Several members of the delegation who sought service at the Durham bus terminal's main restaurant were refused by employees and told they could only be served in the Negro side.

In Richmond, Va. when the group stopped for a rest period, they were again refused service at that city's main bus station restaurant. The group had selected the Durham bus station as a meeting place for the delegation which departed the city early Saturday.

While waiting for the chartered bus to arrive, some of the delegation sought service at the counter of the restaurant formerly reserved for whites. They were told by bus station restaurant workers that they could not be served.

However, all of the delegation used the station's main waiting room without incident.

The group departed the city around 2 a.m. Saturday and returned around 1 a.m. Sunday.

A formal report of the Washington demonstration was made at St. Joseph's A.M.E. Church Sunday evening.

## Beauticians To Gather Sunday

Some 500 beauticians from throughout Tarheelia are expected to assemble in Durham this week end for the opening of the annual state convention of the North Carolina Beauticians and Cosmetologists Association.

This estimate was given by Mrs. Margaret Minor, convention chairman, who outlined the program for the four day meeting which begins Sunday.

Mrs. Minor said arrangements have been made by local convention committee to accommodate 350 delegates and 105 members at large and visitors.

Features of the four day program, according to Mrs. Minor, will include two major addresses by outstanding women personalities, a hair style and fashion show and exhibits and technique demonstrations by various beauty products manufacturers and distributors.

On the lighter side, the local convention committee has planned a banquet, a formal dance, a cocktail party and an outdoor picnic for visiting beauticians.

Headquarters for the convention will be Durham Business College, which will be the scene of most of the meeting's sessions.

Mrs. Katie Whickham, of New Orleans, president of the National Beauty Culturists League and a militant human rights spokesman, will deliver the convention's keynote address at the opening public session on Sunday afternoon at four o'clock at St. Mark A.M.E. Zion Church.

## NCC's Walker Going to Europe, Russell Takes Job at Hofstra

Dr. Roger D. Russell, assistant professor in education at North Carolina College and the school's counselor since 1948, has resigned to accept a position at Hofstra College in Hempstead, Long Island, N. Y.

The Times learned Tuesday that Dr. Russell will become an assistant professor at the integrated New York commuters college.

It is understood he will teach two courses in education and two courses in educational psychology. The NCC professor will be accompanied by his wife, a music supervisor and their son, Frank, a student.

Details regarding the effective date of Dr. Russell's resignation and the salary for the new position were not revealed.

Russell has been the college's counselor since 1948. He is a native of Hampton, Va.

His B. A. degree was earned at Virginia State College, his M. A. at Columbia University, and his doctor's degree at the University of Pennsylvania.

Dr. Russell's employment history includes experience as an employment counselor with the New York Urban League and a teaching position at Edenton High School. He was in charge of English at Edenton High School.

In addition, Dr. Russell served

## Last Rites For County Agent

ROXBORO — Charles Jefferson Ford, Farm Agent of Person County for the last 25 years, died in Person County Memorial Hospital in Roxboro on Wednesday, April 15.

His funeral was held on Saturday, April 18, in the local Shady Hill Baptist Church, in which he was for many years an official. Burial was in Burchwood Cemetery.

Ford was a native of Bamberg County, South Carolina, where he was born in 1885. He was a graduate of South Carolina State A. and M. College and of the North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College. He also studied in the schools of agriculture at Hampton Institute and Cornell University.

Having begun his career in Person County in 1925 as a teacher of vocational agriculture, Ford became the first principal of the Person County High School, a position which he held eight years. (See FORD, Page 8)

26,000 college and high school students descended upon Washington for the second Youth March for Integrated Schools demonstrating their support of the U. S. Supreme Court decision of May 17, 1954, banning segregation in public education.

Assembling in the Sylvan Theatre here at the foot of the Washington Monument on April 18, the youthful marchers from all sections of the country were addressed
