

Some 200 Hillside Students Cited During Annual Awards Day; Marjorie Lennon Is Top-Ranked Senior

Some two hundred Hillside high school students were recipients of awards for scholastic achievement, meritorious service, and athletic participation during the school's annual observance of Awards Day held Friday, May 1, in the school auditorium.

Senior coed, Marjorie Rose Lennon, received the school's highest scholastic honor as the Valedictorian of the senior class.

In addition to receiving the coveted first place scholastic honor, the Hillside coed, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Lennon of South

Alston Avenue, also earned the largest number of individual awards.

Miss Lennon took first place honors for scholastic achievement in English, science, and French, and received honors for meritorious service rendered to the National Honor Society, the Modern Dance Group, and the Hillside Chronicle. Too she received an honor rating of III for instrumental music.

Following Miss Lennon in scholastic awards won, was Travis Jackson Williams, the present President of the Hillside student council.

Williams earned top honors for scholastic achievement in mathematics and social science, and tied for the school's second highest scholastic honor of salutatorian with senior coed Hazel Antonette Ellison.

Williams also earned honors and awards for his outstanding participation in the Debating Club, the National Honor Society, and the Student Council.

During the special morning assembly program, Dr. J. C. Finney was introduced by faculty member L. A. Merritt, and music was rendered by the Hillside special chorus.

Mrs. M. S. Dooms, member of the honors and scholarships committee, presided during the program.

The following organizations presented awards to students who had rendered outstanding service: National Honor Society, Student Council, Broadcaster's Club, Debating Society, Dramatics Club, Dett Choral Club, Future Nurses Club, Y-Teen Club, Juvenile Delinquency Researchers Club, Distributive Education Club, Modern Dance Club, Vocational Club, Body Builders Club, and the Safety Patrol.

Athletic awards were presented in the following areas: football, basketball, track, baseball, and tennis.

The Hillside choral group was also cited for receiving honors at the District Music Festival, and the Hillside band was also cited for its award of a rating of I (superior) in the district music festival.

After N. Y. Success, Chorale To Sing in Durham Friday

The College-Community Chorale, fresh from a successful performance in New York last Saturday, will be heard in its annual spring concert at B. N. Duke Auditorium on Friday evening, May 9, at 8:15 p.m.

The Durham performance is being sponsored by the Merrick-Moore Memorial Park Association. Director of the singers, Howard Roberts, said early this week he was "gratified" at the performance and the "enthusiastic reception" given the chorale in its New York concert Saturday night.

The Chorale sang at the St. Mark Methodist Church.

Roberts said he received personal congratulations on the work of the young group from such well known music luminaries in the St. Mark audience as Hall Johnson, Leonard DePaur, Broadway producers Robert Breen and David Chase, Juilliard professor Gertrude Bamberger and members of the Belafonte singers.

The program for Friday's concert will consist of music from the Baroque, Romantic periods, folk songs, work songs and spirituals.

In the first section are "Ecce Quomodo," by Palestrina; "Draw the Tear from Hopeless Love" from Handel's "Judas Maccabeus"; "Sing Unto God," also by Handel from the "Judas Maccabeus."

In the second group will be "Vas Isti Sylvania," by Schubert and two portions of Debussy's "Trois

Chansons."

The third group will consist of folk songs, featuring works by Robert Shaw; the fourth section will comprise work songs, among which will be heard Noah Ryder compositions and an arrangement by Roberts; and the final section will be made up of Negro Spiritual arrangements by Hall Johnson and William Dawson.

Soloists for the concert will be Mrs. Elna Spaulding, Miss Gwendolyn Tait and Mrs. Margaret Goodwin, sopranos, and J. W. McClinton, tenor.

Mrs. Constance G. Allen will be the accompanist.

Organized last year, the young group has made only two appearances so far this year. In addition to the New York concert, the singers were heard in April in their opening concert at Burlington.

Last year, the chorale sang in concert in May in Duke auditorium and in September for an international meeting of language professors at the University of North Carolina.

The organization is made up of music lovers in the college community and members of various church choirs throughout the city.

Roberts, the chorale director, is himself a concert tenor and has a rich experience in Broadway productions. He was a member of the overseas "Porgy and Bess Troupe." He is currently a teacher of voice at North Carolina College.

NCC Professor Gets Study \$\$

Irving A. McCollum, assistant professor of mathematics at North Carolina College, has been awarded a National Science Foundation Fellowship to do pre-doctoral work at the University of North Carolina.

The fellowships are offered as a means of improving and promoting the teaching of science, mathematics and engineering in American colleges and Universities.

McCollum is one of three NCC recipients of NSF grants. Dr. Marjorie L. Browne, chairman of the department of mathematics, is currently pursuing post doctoral research at UCLA.

Dr. Ezra L. Totton, chairman of the chemistry department, will join McCollum on leave during the coming year when Dr. Totton will do research and post doctoral study at Stanford University.

McCollum, a native of Bennettsville, S. C., received the B. S. degree from Morehouse College and the M.A. from Northwestern University. He has done advanced graduate work at Northwestern and at the University of North Carolina.

He is married to the former Miss Maryland Gear of Oklahoma City, Okla. They have three children, Irving, 16; Alice, 12; and Phillip, 9.

Fayetteville Clergyman on Jamaica Mission

FAYETTEVILLE—One of 15 outstanding North Carolina ministers representing both races recently invited by the Department of Interracial Cooperation of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention to carry forward approximately two weeks of missionary work in Kingston, Jamaica, British West Indies is the Rev. Chaney R. Edwards, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Fayetteville, N. C.

The group left the States on May 8 and is currently about their tasks in Kingston.

Among the areas in which improved techniques are being discussed are the Sunday School, the Baptist Training Union and the whole matter of stewardship. Likewise will stress fall upon evangelistic preaching and the conduct of religious institutes.

Marked the Rev. Edwards to his congregation, "I regard the call as a challenge to practice on foreign soil what I have long preached in America; I have no choice but to heed it." On their return, the group will spend a day in Havana, Cuba.

A North Carolinian by birth who was educated at Shaw University, and at the Union Theological Seminary in New York City, Rev. Edwards is a well-known minister.

From a pastorate at the Spring Garden Baptist Church in Washington, N. C., he came to the First Baptist Church in Fayetteville where in a period of six years, the church has witnessed a substantial increase in membership, and has erected a modern \$13,000 parsonage. Plans are currently in progress for the construction of a new church edifice adequate for a modern, expanded church program.

A progressive young minister whose ability and devotion have been widely heeded, the Rev. Edwards is President of the Fayetteville Ministerial Alliance; Past President of the Shaw University Theological Alumni Association; Moderator of the Tar River Baptist Association; Treasurer of the North Carolina General Baptist Convention; and a member of the Sunday School Board of the National Baptist Convention, U.S.A. Inc.

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
