However, Wilkins pointed out, this urgent problem, as necessary as it is, "must take second place to the vital project of eradicating lynching. Unless citizens are safe in the enjoyment of their basic and human right to a trial in a court when charged with a crime, unless they are certain to receive this and not be subject to the law of the lynch mob, then discussion of other types of inequalities approaches the academic."
Poplarville Plan Cited
The NAACP leader cited a statement attributed by a newspaper to William H. Stewart, county attorney for Pearl River County, Miss., where the Poplarville lynching occurred. The newspaper quoted the attorney as having said: "We would have convicted (Mack Charles Parker) by noon and we planned to let them take it all the way to the Supreme Court. If a federal judge had ordered him released, that's what we would have done right here in Poplarville. Then we would have sent his body to that judge and we would have said,
