

Ebony Fashion Fair to be Held for Urban League in Twin City

WINSTON-SALEM — Glamorous girls, fabulous fashions and an exciting evening will be the menu for 8 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 10 at Fries Auditorium on the campus of Winston-Salem Teachers College.

The occasion will be the Ebony Fashion Fair featuring 10 lovely models and the latest creations of fashion houses in France, Italy, England and America. Mrs. Freda DeKnight who selected the garments, will be narrator.

Sponsors will be the Urban League Aides with the cooperation of local chapters of the National Assn. of College Women, Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Iota Phi Lambda Sorority, the Links and the Beauticians Assn.

Funds raised will become the scholarship fund of the local TST (Tomorrow's Scientists and Technicians) program for high school and college students. The TST is a project of the National Urban League to help young people of minority groups get better training and on-the-job training in fields of science.

Mrs. Martha Young is president of the Aides and co-chairman of the planning committee. Luix V. Overha is planning chairman.

"I have seen pictures of the models and the fashions they will wear in the show," Mrs. Young said. "I am thrilled. I can hardly wait to see the show."

Featured wear in the fair will include both the extreme and the practical in dresses, coats, lounging and formal wear. These creations will serve the style-conscious woman from morning until night whether in the kitchen, on the beach or at a fashionable party.

This is the second year of the fair, which is now touring the nation in a special bus. Models will demonstrate 200 different items during a two-hour program. Music will be provided by the Bernard Foy combo. Linda Lowery Moss will dance during intermission.

Door prizes will be given away during intermission.

Gardeners: If your lawn is too good to dig up and too thin to leave as it is, thicken it with seed. With a steel rake, loosen surface as far down as you can without injuring grass. Seed at the rate of one pound to 500 square feet. Rake it in and topdress with 1/4 inch of screened loam to cover it. Then keep lawn moist. A quiet ceremony was performed at the home of the groom's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Little, on September 15.

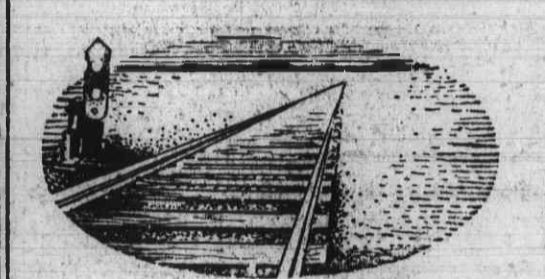
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BOB COLEY
